Acts of Service

On Ash Wednesday, the College celebrated its Commencement Mass in the Centenary Quad. As the morning sun moved across from the east, 1400 students from Years 5 to 12 and 160 staff marked the beginning of Lent as well at the start of another year of challenge, learning and relationship-building. A logistical feat in itself, the majority of participants firstly received ashes from students and staff Eucharistic Ministers followed by communion. Our musicians led by Mrs Fahy, Mr Williams and other music staff provided a reflective atmosphere for this special liturgical event. I appreciate the presence of a great number of parents and grandparents in attendance.

In my address to the community, I emphasised the challenge to be people of service to one another. The words of our communion hymn, The Servant Song, were particularly significant:

From the Deputy Head of College

Have you got the good oil?

Everyone from the prime minister down is calling on us all to be 'innovative' to ensure the country's future is prosperous. What does being innovative actually mean or require of one? From the nation's perspective, innovation is about turning ideas into successful products and services in a rapidly changing world economy. From an education perspective, innovation is about looking at what we currently do well, identifying the great ideas of tomorrow and putting them into place. Education needs to meet individual needs and provide opportunities that connect students to what is happening around the globe. Innovation at Waverley aims to make learning environments more exciting, challenging, rewarding and to liberate the potential in every learner so that he may achieve liberation not just for himself, but for others.

It is important for boys to not forget some of the other key attributes that help lay the foundation for an innovative approach, such as 'sheer determination' and 'hard work'. I read recently about an Australian Olive Oil Farmer, Jeremy Meltzer who in 2006 had an innovative idea to try and sell his produce to the Americans, which no one had done before in Australia. He flew to the USA and door knocked retailers asking them to try his oil. Most people were not interested but he kept trying. Meltzer stated that he 'was so persistent, occasionally someone would buy a case just to get him to go away'.

Meltzer had sold just 500 bottles when he convinced the New York Times to write an article about his oil. They were not interested at first either as they had not heard of Australian Olive Oil, but they tried it and described it as 'liquid gold'. From this article some large retail supermarkets placed orders and he was invited to cook alongside Martha Stewart on her TV show. On the home journey, Meltzer bumped into Australian Chef, Neil Perry who also agreed to use his oil in his restaurants. Meltzer had received many knock backs, but he kept trying and was determined to succeed and he did.

Our Year 12 high achievers spoke last week to our Year 12s and 7s. Each one of them talked about the many hours of study and learning it took to succeed in their final year and like Meltzer, their determination paid off.

Having standards is important

I was impressed with the Queensland Rugby League's recent stance and explanation when some of their best young talent broke curfew at an emerging origin development camp. The new coach, Kevin Walters commented that;

"... they needed to be making smarter choices and unfortunately for them, they did not on this occasion. I'm happy with their honesty in owning up to their breach of the rules and obviously we are extremely upset with them. You have to be responsible for everything that you do. We are trying to protect the brand of Rugby League and State of Origin. I just feel, that if these players could not understand the clear instructions given to them, then it is probably not their time at the moment."

All eight players will not be considered for Queensland this year as a result of their actions. At Waverley, we have high standards and expectations of the boys. When they do the wrong thing we expect them to be honest and to own their mistakes. We all make them and they can provide some of the richest learning experiences for your son.

Far too often in today's society, we hear people trying to defend, legitimise or justify their actions. As a parent, my main responsibility is not to defend the actions of my son, it is to support him and assist him to learn and grow from his mistakes so he can be better in the future where the stakes are higher.

IT Alert: Recall of Apple Wall Socket Power Adaptors

As you may have seen published in the press recently Apple have announced a worldwide recall of certain wall socket power adapters that were issued with Apple products.

Waverley iAssist have worked with Apple to setup a process to replace any affected adapters that may have been issued with student Macbook Airs as follows:

Step 1 - Families should go to https://www.apple.com/au/support/ac-wallplug-adapter/which will explain the adapters effected and how to identify.

Step 2 - If you have an affected adapter you can bring this to E15 where iAssist will replace with a new one (iAssist will have stock of replacement adapters early next week)

Managing Parties and Gatherings: Waverley College Parent Tips and Guidelines

In May 2015, Dr Donna Cross addressed 200 parents on the influence of alcohol and drugs on the teenage brain as well as the challenge of parents managing parties and gatherings.

On that night, parents generated 200 "parent tips" in relation to alcohol and parties. In September, a Think Tank of eleven parents refined these tips and developed the document: *Managing Parties and Gatherings: Waverley College Parent Tips.* We hope it will be of assistance in in any future negotiations you may have with your children.

Top 5 Key Research Points (Dr Donna Cross 2015)

- 1. By age 17, 94.3% have used alcohol
- Most alcohol (28%) is supplied by parents and friends at parties and at home
- Delay alcohol as long as possible as the teenage brain still "under construction"
- 4. Whilst overall alcohol consumption down, binge drinking up: invincibility poor decisions
- 5. The desire to conform and social media are the main influencers on poor teenage decisions

Top 5 Questions:

- 1. Who and how many are attending?
- What are the parents names and phone numbers?
- 3. Are hosts there to supervise / are parents
- 4. Whilst I expect there will be no alcohol, how will you respond if it is offered to you?
- 5. Where is the party and at what times am I dropping you and collecting you?

Top 5 Parent Actions:

- Verify details call parents meet parents at door.
- 2. Collect child no sleepovers.
- Ask the host how they are monitoring the presence of alcohol
- 4. Agree on a text alert symbol or phrase if there is a need to leave the party
- Reach agreement with parents of close friends in relation to expectations

Top 10 Parent Attitudinal Statements / Responses

- 1. It is a non-negotiable that you will be dropped off and picked up
- Hosting a teenage party where alcohol is available is illegal
- Host parents and additional parents are essential if a party is to be safe
- 4. I have a right to call and talk to other parents
- Research shows that sleepovers provide an the main opportunity for underage drinking
- 6. I expect that parents are not drinking alcohol during teenage parties.
- 7. I expect you to be ready to leave when I arrive to get you

- 8. You are able to attend the party but you will not be sleeping over
- 9. I expect parents to be present at parties
- I am happy to negotiate a pick-up time based on the following: Y7: 7pm / Y8: 8pm / Y9: 9pm / Year 10: 10pm / Year 11: 11pm.

Waverley CAS Swimmers making a Splash in the Open Water

Two of our 14-year-old CAS Swim Team Members recently competed in the 2.5km 'Big Swim' event between Whale and Palm Beaches in Sydney's north

Ned Wieland and Stuart Swinburn, both in Year 9, finished the race in a great time with Stuart finishing an impressive 15th overall out of 1453 finishers in the opens division in a time of 31.29 while his year mate Ned managed 44th overall in a time of 35.8.

Stuart, who trains with the Waverley College CAS squad as well as the UNSW club trains most mornings of the week and is looking forward to the CAS Carnival at Homebush on March 10th. Stuart believes the choppy conditions in open water swimming is great for developing his stroke in his pet events, the breaststroke and freestyle.

Ned who has had four years experience in the open water events enjoys the longer distances of the ocean swim and the opportunity of travelling to some beautiful venues to compete. At the CAS carnival, Ned will be competing in the butterfly and freestyle events.

CAS Coach Mr Tony Moore, an avid ocean swimmer himself, says ocean swimming is a great complement to the work done in the pool. Its extended duration is a great developer of aerobic capacity for the 800m and 1500m pool events.

Mr Moore says open water swimming provides variety and gives the boys a break from chasing the black line up and down the pool each morning.

Finally the social a health benefits of swimming is an advantage for all ages as it's an activity which promotes involvement in life long physical activity.

From a social justice point of view most ocean swimming events support community groups and charities such as local surf clubs and members of the community who are less fortunate.

From the Head of Learning Support

Waverley College, along with all Australian schools, will be carrying out a process of Nationally Consistent Collection of Data for Student with Disabilities - a count of the number of students who are supported under the school's obligations to comply with the Disability Discrimination Act 1992 and Disability Standards for Education 2005.

The count is based on the professional judgment of teachers and their knowledge and understanding of students.

The process assists the school in identifying and supporting students with disabilities so we can put adjustments in place to enable them to access and participate in education on the same basis as their peers.

The data collected is not identifiable to individual students. Information collected relates to the numbers of students involved; the types

of adjustments provided, including curriculum delivery, medical support, health and safety, social skills and communication; the level of adjustment provided and the categories of disabilities.

In the first instance, the information is submitted to the Catholic Education Commission then forwarded, as non-identifiable data, to the Australian Government Education Council (ie student names will not be captured). The information collected is protected by the Privacy Act. The information collected may be used for the school's future funding and policy requirements.




Library News

Basketball Round-Up

The 2nd V played very well to overcome Cranbrook in a close game and post their second win of the season. The fourth quarter saw Waverley's 'never give up' attitude, despite being down by 20. Waverley's full-court pressure forced Cranbrook into turnovers, which lead to baskets early on. In the last 2 minutes of the game Waverley showcased beautiful basketball where the ball was moved constantly until a wide open man was found. Waverley won the fourth quarter, but unfortunately not the game, ultimately losing 66-52.

Can personality determine career success?

After all, having an interest in a career or course doesn't always mean that you're going to be good at it, and telling children they can be anything they want, doesn't necessary correlate with the facts.

In the US, a university study followed over 80,000 students in 87 colleges over a five year period. Even the NSW Board of Studies is getting serious about personality by moving to institute personality tests for teacher training.
