## From the Head of College

### National Men's Health Week

This week the College celebrated National Men's Health Week and I would like to thank Mr Patrick Darvill and our PDHPE Department for organising the many health and wellbeing events this week aimed at getting the boys and staff to reflect on an area of life that boys/men are not very good at. Over the years research has consistently shown that men are more hesitant than women to visit the family doctor and seek help when it comes to both physical and mental health issues. In Australia, for every \$4 we spend on women's health, we only spend \$1 on men's health. So Mothers, this is an area where you can have a big influence and make a difference to your son's health.

The week is designed to get conversations started and toraise awareness of the services they can access to stay healthy inside and out. The students had guest speakers and presentations on a range of topics including teen nutrition, bouncing back (resilience and overcoming adversity) yoga and pilates. Our wellbeing messages for the week covered topics such as gambling, testicular cancer, suicide and the benefits of managing time for your mental health

### Prayers

Our thoughts and prayers this week went out to the people of Orlando USA, who suffered a mass shooting last weekend where 49 precious lives were lost. Archbishop Joseph Kurtz - President of the US Conference for Catholic Bishops wrote:

*"Waking up to the unspeakable violence in Orlando reminds us of how precious human life is. Our prayers are with the victims, their families and those affected by this terrible act. The merciful love of Christ calls us to solidarity with the suffering and to even greater resolve in protecting life and the dignity of every person."*

It must be hard for many people in the USA to deal with their country's inability to deal with their violence and gun issues. Last year the USA had at least 381 Mass Shootings. (ShootingTracker.com defines a mass shooting as an incidence where at least four people are killed or wounded by gunfire, including perpetrator/s.) That is more than the days in the year!

### Hope

It reminded me of how lucky we are in this country, even when compared to another democratic, developed country such as the USA. We do not have this level of violence or the number of guns. It is election time and it is easy to find yourself in a negative state of mind thinking about our politicians. But, 20 years ago, we had our Orlando experience in Port Arthur where 35 people were murdered by a man with a semi automatic assault gun that was purchased without holding a gun licence.

Our politicians of the time, made the courageous decision and had the foresight to ensure such an atrocity would not happen again. It was an unpopular move to take on the gun lobby, but the government introduced a buy back scheme which saw more than 700,000 guns destroyed. The National Firearms Programme Implementation Act 1996, restricts the private ownership of semi-automatic rifles, semi-automatic shotguns and pump-action shotguns as well as introducing uniform firearms licensing. Our politicians made a call others have been unable to make and our country has been safer because of it. We have not had a single mass shooting since that day. All of us go about our business on the way to work, to school, to church and to the movies, knowing that the chances an armed assailant is going to turn up is much less likely.

We are of course not perfect in this country and we need to keep working on; equality, reconciliation, saying no to bullying, domestic violence, our compassion towards those in detention and those fleeing from the world's trouble spots as refugees needs to also improve. But, we do have a lot to feel lucky about and hope filled that we as individuals and the people we vote in as our representatives, can make significant changes. We pray that our politicians can be as decisive as they were on gun control 20 years ago on some of the issues aforementioned and achieve what is at the core of an Edmund Rice School: to be inclusive; to liberate oneself and those less fortunate; to be just; and to stand in solidarity with those on the margins.

This week I was fortunate enough to attend the EREA Deputy Principal's conference held in Adelaide. It is a great opportunity to view what is happening at the

### Interesting Article

I came across this interesting article in the Community Coaching News and I thought it might be an ideal time to share it with the Waverley Community.

#### 'How the post-game ride can kill a child's love of sport'

Children are dropping out of sport in droves between the ages of 12 and 15, and the principal reason they give researchers is that they are no longer having fun.

What they consider 'fun' can change as children develop. Several researchers have tried to define the concept with one suggesting that younger children associate movement sensations as a source of enjoyment, while older children find enjoyment in the social recognition of competence and the experience of encouragement, excitement and challenge.

So what robs our children of this 'fun'? There can be many elements in the mix — dislike of the coach, overemphasis on winning, burnout, competing priorities — but one commonly cited culprit is parental pressure.

We have all seen or heard the 'ugly parent' who loudly offers an opinion, abuses officials, provides 'sideline coaching', or even initiates altercations with other spectators.

Yet pressure on children is not always so obvious.

An informal survey conducted across 30 years by two former long-time coaches in America asked hundreds of college athletes what their worst memory was from playing youth and high school sports.

Overwhelmingly they replied that it was the ride home from the game with their parents.

The majority of parents who make this ride home miserable do so inadvertently. Their conversation about the game can range from observations about coaching decisions, officiating decisions, the skill levels of other players, and even questioning why their child forgot the techniques and strategies they've been practicing.

On that ride home, children transition from fun-loving and exhausted player back to pressured child while their parents continue to 'sideline coach', and sometimes continue to do so until the following week's game. Many kids will reach the conclusion that if they quit the sport they might get their mother or father back.

Children have told researchers that they much more enjoy having their grandparents watch them play because they are simply enthusiastic spectators and are more likely to offer a smile and a hug and simply say, 'I love watching you play'.

Here are some tips on how parents can make the car ride home more enjoyable:

- let the child initiate a conversation about the game when they're ready or have a question
- provide answers that are mindful and don't carry an element of blame or lead into a longer conversation about the quality of the game
- help children see the big picture rather than focusing on one single event to make the trip home more enjoyable for everyone.

### Ready for an Argument

During winter, students representing Waverley College take part in two Sydney debating competitions. During Term 2, our students compete in the Catholic Schools Debating Competition while in Term 3 we move to the CAS Debating. All debates are held on Friday evenings.

Students are presented with a current affairs topic and are required to plan and articulate an argument for or against. They receive their topic at 6pm and have to prepare their argument within one hour. The only resource they are allowed to use is a dictionary.

Both junior and senior debaters train twice a week in line with other co-curricular activities.

Staff work with the junior team during the week developing their critical thinking and research

skills. Students have no doubt about the benefits of selecting debating as their co-curricular activity. The team enjoys interacting with students from other schools on a more personal level than in other co-curricular activities. The boys also appreciate how the skills developed in debating improve their confidence in a social setting. The junior debating team appreciates the skills their opponents possess and believe they can learn from them each week.

The senior debating team enjoy the opportunity to express their views on current local and international issues. Students thrive when discussing current affairs with their peers.

Debating Convener Ms Cassandra Hill, who is also an English teacher at the College, believes debating enhances the boys skills in developing a rhetoric which no doubt improves their essay writing technique.

During week six, the senior debaters travelled to the UNSW for a one-day competition against other independent schools from across Sydney. The boys competed in 2-3 debates throughout the day. Waverley College won five debates in total and received valuable advice and feedback from the University's debating society. They were commended on their abilities and the outstanding manner in which they represented the College.

We wish our senior debaters well for their semi-finals which are being held at Loreto Kirribilli on June 17th.

## Collaboration with Christian Brothers High School Lewisham

On Friday 17 June I accompanied Orlando Norman (Yr 12) and Hal Cumpston (Yr 11) to Christian Brothers High School in Lewisham to participate in a unique Aboriginal experience. Orlando is performing an Aboriginal monologue from a play called "No Sugar" by Jack Davis for his HSC. CBHS Lewisham have a large number of Aboriginal students and there is a wonderful teacher, Kaleb Taylor, who runs their Aboriginal Unit. I contacted him to see if he would be interested in helping Orlando with a movement piece/dance that he needs to perform at the start of his monologue. His piece is set at a corroboree. Kaleb agreed and withdrew a number of their students to participate in this special workshop. Those students were brilliant. At the beginning of the workshop they performed a special purification ritual and gave us a piece of red fabric to wear for the duration of the workshop that had been blessed by a Tribal elder.

The CBHS students performed a few different dances such as the "Spear Fisherman" and the "Black bird". Orlando and Hal were both taught how to do these dances and Orlando decided to use the "Spear Fisherman" for his piece. Orlando performed his monologue for everyone and was given some good, constructive feedback by everyone. It was a very enjoyable experience and an absolute highlight for me. I do hope our two EREA schools get to collaborate again in the future.

## Year 10 Reflection Days 2016

The Year 10 Reflection Days (which took place on the 7th and 8th June) consist of two consecutive days of contrasting topics. One of the days involves listening to Mr Sam Clear (Walk4One) tell of his adventures walking around the world for Christian Unity. Not only do the students get a vivid account of the trials and tribulations of such an undertaking but they also receive an insight into prayer, trust in God and an understanding of what 'unity' really means.

The second day includes a visit to the Sydney Jewish Museum where a Holocaust survivor addresses the students. Here the students receive an education in the cruelty that people can inflict on one another when the dignity of every human being is ignored. The other part of this day involves guest speakers. This year we were fortunate enough to have representatives from the Refugee Council of Australia address the students, including an actual refugee who recounted her journey. Below are reflections on these events from Year 10 SRC Student Jesse Douglas:

### Refugee Talk

*The Reflection Days proved to be a very interesting experience that Year 10 participated in on the 6th and 7th of June, 2016. One of the activities involved a talk from an Iraqi refugee who spoke about her many experiences when her family fled from the conflict in Iraq to Australia. This enthralling experience was both entertaining and informing, as it discussed many realistic situations that refugees must go through to get to a safe country and the many obstacles and life threatening situations that you can be put through. Halfway through the session, the Year 10's were split into separate groups and told to answer different problems and questions associated with Refugees. They were encouraged to solve or investigate issues such as "How would you feel as a refugee, if you moved to a strange place where you didn't speak the language?" or "How would you feel to leave your family and friends, along with everything you know to move to a new place?" After asking a few year 10 students, many responded positively to the talk. One student, Jack Chia, said, "I was really moved by the speaker's story; it made me think about, and feel sorry for, the other people still stuck in the limbo of the Refugee Detention Centres".*

### Sydney Jewish Museum

Adam McCabe (Year 10 SRC) recounts his visit to the Sydney Jewish Museum:

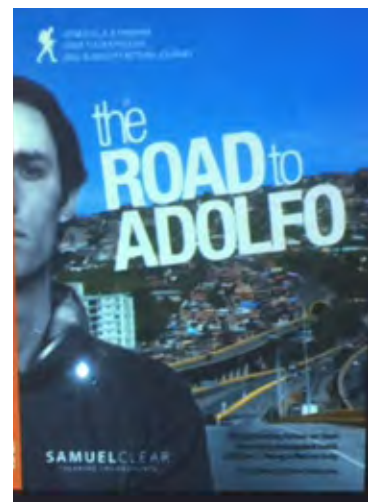
*On the 7th and the 8th of June half of the Year 10 Year group ventured into the City as we were headed for the Jewish Holocaust Museum. We had a first hand point of view from a Holocaust Survivor that detailed her whole experience, from being captured to the day that she was liberated when she from the Concentration Camp. After the 30 min recount of her story, everyone knew that today was a day of reflection and how appreciative we should be of our lives and how grateful we are to be so blessed with all of the opportunities that we have been given. After looking at the Anne Frank section of the Museum, which recalled her whole life, the excerpts from her diary gave us an understanding of how the Jewish people were treated from that point in time. We then moved on to the Letters section where they had a wide collection of Jewish people's letters that they had collected and this is where most people got very emotionally touched as it was a very personal time as we would walk around and read their letters. Through this experience all of the Year 10 boys had a very eye opening day as they were able to really appreciate what we have in our lives and how this experience should change the way that we treat other people and our own thinking towards others.*



### Sam Clear – Walk4One

On one of the Year 10 Reflection Days, the students ventured to "The Centre" in Randwick to listen to a talk from, Mr Sam Clear. Sam was part of a unity for Christians project that sent him walking from the coastlines of Brazil to the Spanish beaches. In the talk he told the Year 10 groups about the many hardships and difficulties that he had to go through on his "walk for unity". He told Year 10 about his encounter with thugs on the side of a highway in Russia, his time with a poverty stricken family in Central America, and the many 'near death' experiences that befell him. His talk's purpose was to raise awareness about the situations of other people around the world compared to us here in Australia, and to pray for a more united church, society and world. The impact this had on the Year 10's was quite dramatic; many were enthralled and absorbed by his experiences, with even a few laughs here and there. The day was fun and compelling regarding world issues, and a real eye opener to the conditions of other people in very different situations to our way of living.

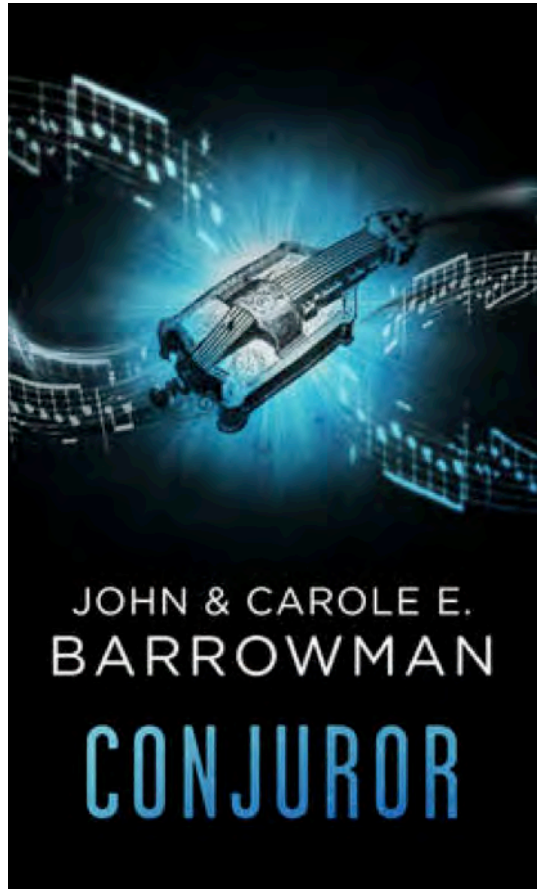

### Waverley College 1st XV Vs Barker College

The Waverley College 1st XV travelled up to Hornsby last Friday to play against Barker College in Round 5 of the CAS Competition. This match was rescheduled following the wild weekend of weather. Barker was coming off their first season victory in Round 4, which had given the North Shore side a boost in confidence.

As soon as the whistle blew, it was clear that the visitors wanted to set the tempo of the match with plenty of upbeat running rugby. Jackson Mohi slid through the defensive line, like a hot knife through butter, to put Jaya Yoannidis over within two minutes of play.

Patrick Clifton was forced off the field with an ankle injury early on, which was concerning for Waverley. Luca Moretti, who was backing up from representing South Harbour, made up for Clifton's absence making some excellent charges up field for the Waves.

Zac Carr was next to score unchallenged, from a lovely pass from Tyzac Jordan at halfback. Joel Ellis then showed his "Jonathan Thurston" like skills selling the big dummy before racing away for Waverley's third try.

Barker hit back following some unfortunate Waverley handling errors, but a Jackson Mohi try out wide had the boys from Bondi way leading comfortably at the break, 26-8.

A nice rolling maul off the lineout had Waverley on the front foot early in the second half. This led to Jordan showing his famous footwork to dive over the line with ease. When Tom "Sonny Bill" Fuller got a nice ball away to put Mohi away for his second try, the scoreboard had Waverley 30 points clear.

Jordan came off the field for a break, but not before troubling the scorers once more with an easy try. All the momentum was with Waverley.

Liam Smith, who played one of his best matches of 2016, went over for a well deserved 5-pointer. Ellis got his double for the match and when Fuller went in under the sticks, the margin had gone beyond 50. The final score was 66 – 8, in favour of the "Double V".

This was a tremendous achievement for the boys in Blue and Gold, and one of the most convincing victories at Hornsby in a number of years. While the score was significant, Waverley still could have improved on a number of elements in the game.

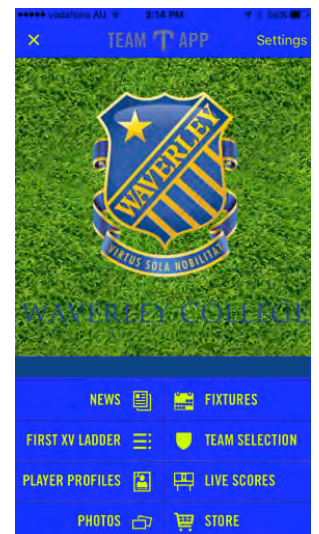
