The event was attended by literally hundreds of students and family members. Special thanks must go to our Visual Arts and TAS Faculties for the hard work they put into preparing the student works and the exhibition. Thanks must also go to our tireless hospitality teachers who worked with a team of their students to provide a delicious range of finger food for the evening that was consumed with gusto by our guests.

At the awards ceremony guest speaker, Craig Waddell spoke about the way that his cohort of school friends used school to explore their creative abilities and how his own career as an artist began. He commended in particular the works of Harrison Kyriakou and Liam Molloy, both of Year 12, which he thought were outstanding.

For the first time at this event we were able to include the HSC projects of our TAS students including Industrial Technology Timber, D&T and Industrial Technology Multimedia; their work was very popular and attracted much admiration.

The range and standard of the works on display at this year's exhibition is a credit to our talented Visual Arts and TAS students and their teachers.

I would like to express my appreciation to Mrs Antoinette McGahan, Principal of St Clare's College, and her staff for their involvement and support. Waverley College values all interactions and initiatives with St Clare's, with whom we share many families.

R U OK? Day is a national day of action held annually to encourage people to regularly and meaningfully ask, 'are you ok?' to support those struggling with life. On this day it is important that schools promote meaningful conversations and ongoing support.

I commend Josh for his initiative and encourage our community to support him in showing people who suffer from depression that there is strong support for them in our community and that nobody needs to suffer alone.

Deputy Head of College: Student Wellbeing Model for 2017

The College is continuing to build on its Wellbeing Program. There are significant bodies of research that support the synergistic relationship between the quality of student wellbeing and student learning. In 2017 we will see some significant changes take place.

A new position has been added to the College Executive, the Director of Student Wellbeing. This position will work in partnership with the Deputy Head of College and the Director of the Junior school to provide leadership in all aspects of student wellbeing and formation of students across Years 5-12. This partnership provides leadership of the Student Wellbeing Team and consists of:

- Deputy Head of College
- Director of Student Wellbeing
- Director of Junior School
- Assistant Director of Junior School
- 8 Heads of House
- 3 Counsellors
- Administration Assistant Student Wellbeing.

This team will work on ensuring there is consistency and commonality in care, procedures and processes across schools, houses and year levels

The College is phasing out the Head of Year roles and introducing a Head of House position for each current House in the College. This will see an increase of two wellbeing leadership positions on where we currently stand.

These positions will provide leadership and care of each one of the eight College Houses in all aspects of student wellbeing and formation of students. They will work in partnership with the Student Wellbeing Team in tracking and developing

each boy's intellectual, spiritual, social, emotional, cultural, behavioural and physical elements with the support of the entire Waverley College staff. The Head of House will ensure their House is the cornerstone of student wellbeing at Waverley College, and ensure the House serves as a 'community' within the College and is the student's 'place of belonging' whilst at the College.

Prof. Donna Cross (Edith Cowan University) has done a lot of work with Waverley College over the last few years and her research would support that investment made by the College to build students' sense of belonging and connectedness to the College as well as efforts to build positive relationships between the staff and students and between students, will contribute significantly to positive academic and behavioural outcomes.

Some of the other elements of the plan include:

- Wellbeing Program is sequenced and mapped from Year 5 -12 (curriculum, outdoor education, retreats, guest speakers, social development, health and activities)
- Closer connection between the Junior and Senior schools and a more seamless transition
- Better tracking of students from Years 5 - 12
- Greater focus on Staff Wellbeing
- Every boy is closely connected to the House Wellbeing program.

I will discuss further aspects of the program in the coming newsletters along with some of Dr Michael Carr- Gregg's address to Waverley College parents recently

Walkathon - A Message from Mr Gill

In 1989, Mrs Helen Newman, began a tradition here at the Junior School by starting a walkathon to help with a charity which was helping children suffering from Cancer. The Malcolm Sargent Cancer fund (Now Redkite) was the first beneficiary of our annual walkathon and one which we have continually supported for the past 28 years. This term, on Friday September 16th, the Junior School is holding its Annual Walkathon. Over the last twelve years the boys from the Junior School have raised nearly half a million dollars with more than 15 different charities being beneficiaries of this good work. This year the money that is raised will once again be donated to charity.

We will support eight different groups, three main charities being;

- Edmund Rice Camps (<http://www.edmundrice.org/Edmund-Rice-Camps-NSW>) – helping to support teenagers with troubled family lives
- The Starlight foundation (<http://www.starlight.org.au>) – helping to ease the suffering of children in hospital
- The Sydney Childrens Hospital foundation (<http://www.schf.org.au>) - providing vital support to help make the lives of our brave young patients brighter.

These three charities will receive 25% each of the money raised with smaller amounts going to;

- Redkite (<http://www.redkite.org.au/>)
- Cure for Life Foundation (<http://www.cureforlife.org.au>)
- Savio Education Centre (<http://www.stedmunds.nsw.edu.au/>)
- Prostate Cancer Foundation (<http://www.prostate.org.au>).
- As a further demonstration to the boys of our Edmund Rice ethos, we will also be providing Christmas Hampers to families within our community needing a spiritual lift this year. More information of this will arrive in Term 4.

This is a great opportunity for your son to develop a sense of pride for doing something to help others in need. This follows the Edmund Rice ethos on which our school was founded. We ask that you encourage your son as much as possible to help support this worthwhile event.

Last year was our biggest yet. We raised just under \$58,500.00 and we would like to emulate this effort again this year. Using the forms which will be sent home shortly, the boys will be asked to get as many sponsorships over the next few weeks as they can. After all the money has been collected a receipt will be sent home. If a sponsor who has donated more than \$20 would like a receipt please send the sponsors details along with the money/cheque and a receipt will be sent home with your son. Money collection will not need to be finalised until the second week of Term 4 (AFTER the Walkathon).

We have 290 boys and this year we are aiming to acknowledge all worthy efforts students make in fundraising. We want to give prizes to every hard working student. We will also have a reward for the class which raises the most money towards the walkathon (Lunch and a movie) and major prizes for some of the boys who raise in excess of \$250.

Donations of any prize such as restaurant or gift vouchers, movie passes, T-shirts, games, books, caps, surfing items or anything else the boys would like, will be greatly appreciated. No item should be considered too small or too cheap as a prize. If you are able to help with providing a larger prize please contact me at the Junior School. If you would like to donate cash to go towards these rewards, this would also help.

Weekly Prayer

This week I have taken the reflection from an email I receive each week: Weekly Parables for Catholic Schools (GPBS enews) This is a reflection on the Sunday Gospel (Luke 13: 22-30) for the 21st Sunday in Ordinary Time.

Remember Your Dinner Partner

Was Jesus talking about the church car park in this Gospel? Watch a church car park after Mass. See who lets others go first and who races to be the first out, cutting off other parishioners.

Or maybe Jesus was talking about the sign of peace. I remember one parishioner who refused to offer it to another because he was angry with him.

Or maybe Jesus was talking about who is welcome at church. I remember a parishioner who was angry when her church let homeless people spend the night in a parish building.

I think Jesus was talking about all of the above in this week's Gospel. You see, going to church, where we eat and drink in Jesus' company, is really pretty easy. It takes about an hour. But after the final blessing, some people think they've done their part for the week and don't connect that "meal" with their behaviour for the next six days.

But following Jesus requires much more. The challenge we face is letting the Sunday Eucharist shape our lives all week long. How does your weekly meal with Jesus shape how you play sports, treat outsiders, live with family, work at your job, and act at school?

There's another challenge in this reading. We might be surprised, Jesus says, by who we meet at God's banquet in heaven. I've met homeless people who never go to church but are more compassionate than some people I know who go to church daily.

So go to church. Eat and drink in Jesus' company. But remember your dinner partner for the rest of the week. And also remember he dines with a lot of people we'll never see in church.

If you were on trial for being a Christian, would the prosecution find enough evidence if they looked only at the way you live your life Monday through Saturday?

From the Director of Curriculum

The HSC Countdown

On Wednesday 24th August, Year 12 attended a study skills session titled 'The HSC Countdown' with Dr Prue Salter from Enhanced Learning Educational Services. The aim was to help Year 12 put together a plan of attack for between now and their final exams.

The session focused firstly on what students need to do before the end of term. It is essential that study notes are completed, students work through their returned Trial HSC exam papers thoroughly (using the checklist provided), pinpoint areas of weakness and seek help on these, and endeavour to do as much practise of essay writing and past examination papers as they can before the end of term so they can obtain feedback from teachers.

These last weeks of school are also the time where some students do not necessarily use their class time as effectively as they could, however after making the plan for the weeks just prior to the HSC exams, students can now see how quickly the time will go and how important it is to use the rest of this term to the full. Year 12 also reviewed the study techniques they are using and looked at ways to improve and avoid common study mistakes using research about the brain.

Each year 12 student also filled out a grid with their

HSC exam timetable, planning the best way to allocate their study time over the weeks prior and during the HSC exams using the guidelines Prue explained.

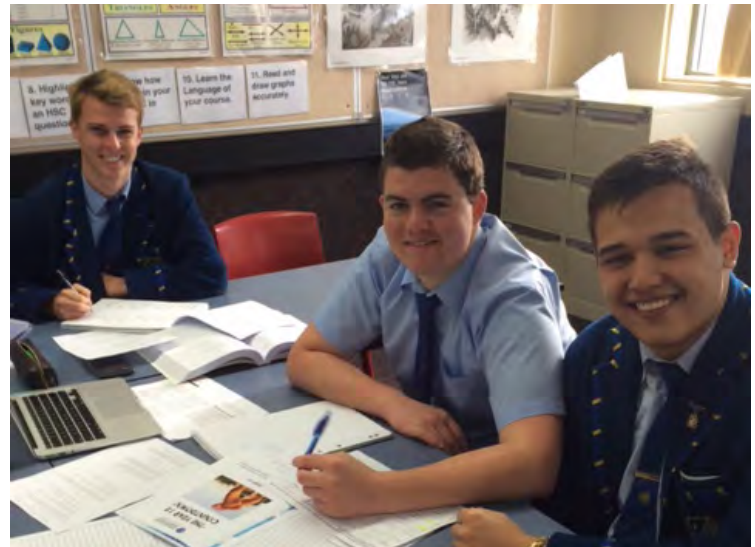
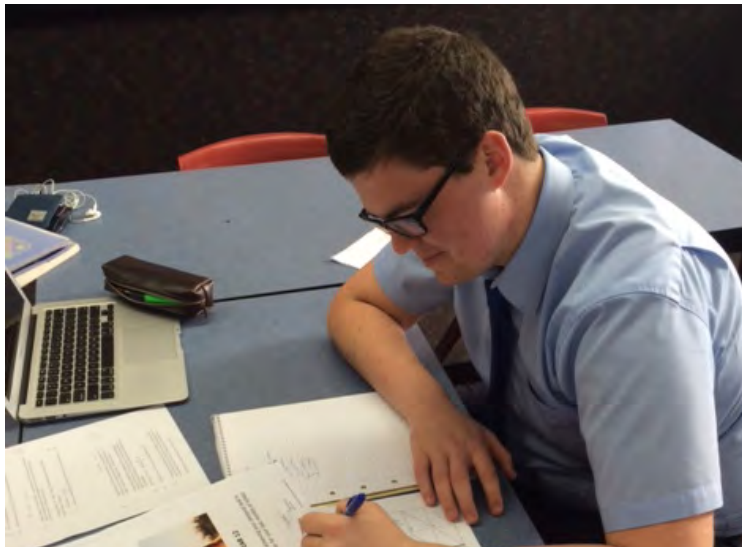
Having a plan in place can take away a lot of exam anxiety, as students know what they need to do to move forward and can see the steps they need to take to make the most of the last few months of their final year of school.

Parents are encouraged to review the handout from the session with students and have students explain their study plan as often discussing these ideas can clarify students' approach. Director of Mission: Quinn House Mass

The Quinn House Mass was celebrated by College Chaplain Fr Milani on Monday 22nd August 2016.

The Year 7 Green students did a particularly good job of dramatising the Gospel 'The Judgement of the Nations' (Matthew 25:31-50) while House Captain, Florian Di Bartolomeo gave an insightful Reflection on this Gospel and the EREA Touchstone 'Justice and Solidarity', which has been our focus for 2016. His Reflection is printed below. The final House Mass is for Tevlin House and will take place on Monday 5th September, 2016.

Today I ask you to reflect on the Gospel of Matthew and see how you, as men of Waverley College, can take the teachings in this passage and use them in your everyday life.

In the passage it says those who had spent their lives recognising and acting upon unjust situations, were identified by the Father and were sent to heaven, whereas the others who turned a blind eye to their disadvantaged fellow human beings, were not rewarded with this place in heaven.

This parable illustrates the notions and beliefs of justice and solidarity in a way that clearly emphasises their importance in society and how beneficial their influence is to those who follow these teachings.

But how can we as members of Quinn House use the knowledge from this text and implement it into our lives and in our community?

What kind of wrongful situations do we come across everyday that we could influence, to help grow the sense of justice and solidarity in our community?

What actions could we take to unify our House or the College?

As a community these questions need to be addressed, as I don't think the answers are as hard or as out of reach as we may believe they are.

Let us start with the wrongful situations that I believe occur in the majority of our homes. How often do you partake in all of the chores your parents ask you to do? Or intervene in bullying or unjust situations that you come across in the playground? I know that for me I definitely don't do enough around the house and sometimes I turn a blind-eye. I know this isn't an example of feeding the poor or helping the homeless, but it is an example of an unjust situation, that can easily be influenced by the simple actions that all of us could go home and take tonight.

Within such a large community such as Waverley College, that's filled with boys, wrongful situations, such as bullying and arguments, are bound to happen. But should we just turn and walk away and let these things keep happening as the "goats" on Jesus' left side did? Or should we stand up and take action as the "sheep" on his right did throughout their lives?

As a House, I challenge you to stand up and say something next time you see these things happening. Take some action and help the situation, whether that be by stepping in and calming down the situation or by getting a teacher involved; whatever it takes, but if you create a just environment in the process, you as an individual have succeeded in creating solidarity within that part of the College.

Until I read the Gospel passage I thought that my action would not have a big effect in the community but after thinking about these words, I realised that, through small actions, I could make a big difference by changing the thoughts and actions of the boys in this College. It's almost like a ripple affect, by these smalls acts we create a bigger movement.

Thank you for listening this morning; hopefully you can take some of the insight that I have given you and use it in your everyday life to make a change for the better.

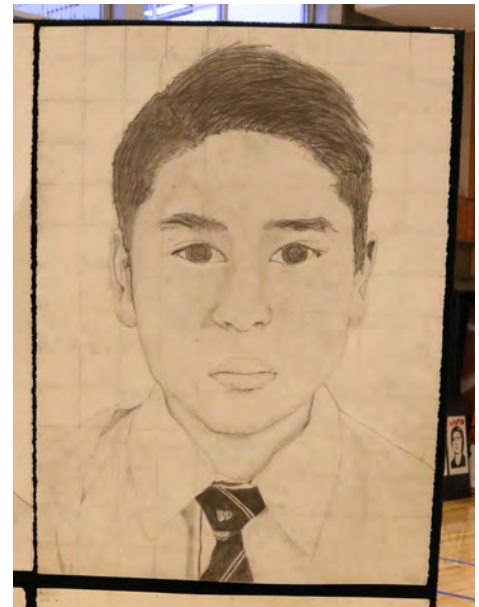

Vietnam Vets Association Visit

The historian Suzannah Lipscomb stated: "History is debate, is discussion, history is a conversation". The Vietnam Veterans Association representative Vin Cosgrove's visit to address Waverley College Year 10 students encapsulated all three of Lipscomb's observations.

The 50th Anniversary of the Battle of Long Tan has recently found its way into public debate. When national memories and public history clash such as the issue of commemorating events overseas such as the Battle of Long Tan, history is more debate than discussion. As Vin explained, what is needed is dialogue – a conversation. A conversation is polite, and sees both perspectives. A debate more one-sided, more emotional.

As an ex-infantry soldier, Vin provided a thought-provoking presentation which rested on three pillars of conversation: the Battle of Long Tan, the use of pesticides (Agent Orange), and its continuing effect of Vets, and the recent 'bring home' of Australian soldiers' remains from Vietnam. Each of these three pillars contained personal insights from Vin, photographs taken by him whilst in Vietnam, and a range of multimedia aids including movies, songs and maps.

Students were chosen to dress in infantry clothes and equipment, and a range of weapons were displayed. Vin expressed his disdain for the 'jumping jack' mine, and students were shown its deceptive size, and lethal and maiming qualities.

Perhaps the most poignant experience for the students was Vin and his wife, Nancy, simulating the conscription ballot. By replicating the government's approach, it was discovered that over half of the students present would have been called up for duty.

In closing, it would be remiss not to mention the respect and courtesy Vin received from the Year 10 students. They collectively made Vin feel welcome and some made the effort to stay behind and thank him personally for his time, and for his service to his country.

Waverley 2nd XI football team. The morning began as usual, the boys turned up at Death Valley (a.k.a Queens Park) at 8:00am, emerged into the change room, said their hellos to the fellow players and began getting ready for a big game. You could sense the intensity about the game, the warm-up was concentrated and the boys were ready for the final CAS game of 2016.

The conclusion of the warm up saw the boys make their way to the sideline of the famous Queens Park 1 field, and begin final preparations for a cracking game to follow. The tunnel was formed by Waverley 1st XI players who had turned up early to watch their peers in the 2nd XI, and they could definitely sense the readiness of this bunch of players.
