From the Head of College

A Successful Winter Season

Congratulations to all of our students who competed so well during our Winter sport season. Special congratulations to the 1st XV Rugby who took out a shared premiership with Knox, defeating Barker 49-0. Both schools had nine wins and a loss to finish at the top of the table. It was the first time since 2009 that the CAS Premiership has been shared and the first time in seven years that the College has brought home the Shield. Rugby Premiers also included 3rd XV (undefeated), 4th XV, 16As, 13As (undefeated) and 13Cs.

Dr Michael Carr-Gregg

The highlight of this week at the College was the visit by Dr Michael Carr-Gregg, one of Australia's most respected child and adolescent psychologists, to speak with both staff and families about student wellbeing on Tuesday 16 August.

Dr Carr-Gregg addressed the staff during the afternoon, providing valuable insights into identifying students who are struggling. Over 400 parents from our community later gathered in the gym for the Dr Michael Carr-Gregg lecture on 'Raising Happy and Resilient Kids'.

The lecture was part of a major initiative from the College - supported by the P&F Association - to provide our students with best-practice pastoral care during their time at school.

Managing each student's wellbeing is inevitably a partnership between home and school and it is important that the College shares the latest research and practice with our families: Dr Michael Carr-Gregg provided attendees with strategies and insights into building a child's resilience, especially during the teenage years.

Paired with this presentation was a briefing from our Deputy Head of College, Graham Leddie, on the new Wellbeing Model the school will implement in 2017.

Feedback from parents who attended the event has been extremely positive. Unfortunately we are not allowed to release any recordings of the event but Deputy Head of College, Graham Leddie, will be providing a summary of some of the key points as

Matthew is currently the Deputy Principal and Head of Teaching and Learning at Worawa Aboriginal College in Victoria. Prior to this, he was Head of Senior School at Ringwood Secondary School in Victoria. During his time at Ringwood, Matthew also carried out the roles of Wellbeing Programs Co-ordinator, Year Co-ordinator and Duke of Edinburgh Co-ordinator. Matthew will be relocating to Sydney with his family, beginning his appointment during Term 4.

Heads of House. You may have already been aware that these are currently being advertised. Each Head of House will have responsibility for 140 students across all year groups, replacing the Head of Year positions, which currently care for around to 200 students each.

Wellbeing Centres

Plans are now being finalised for two new centres in the Senior School, each designed to support student wellbeing. These are the Health Centre, which will be located at Centenary Ground Floor West and the Wellbeing Centre, to be located on the top floor of the Conlon Building. The Health Centre will provide a high level of care for students who are unwell. The Wellbeing Centre will provide office and meeting spaces for the Heads of House and the Director of Student Wellbeing as well as "time out" spaces for students with wellbeing concerns and issues. It is anticipated that these centres will be completed for the start of Term 1, 2017. A further space will be identified in the Junior School before the end of term.

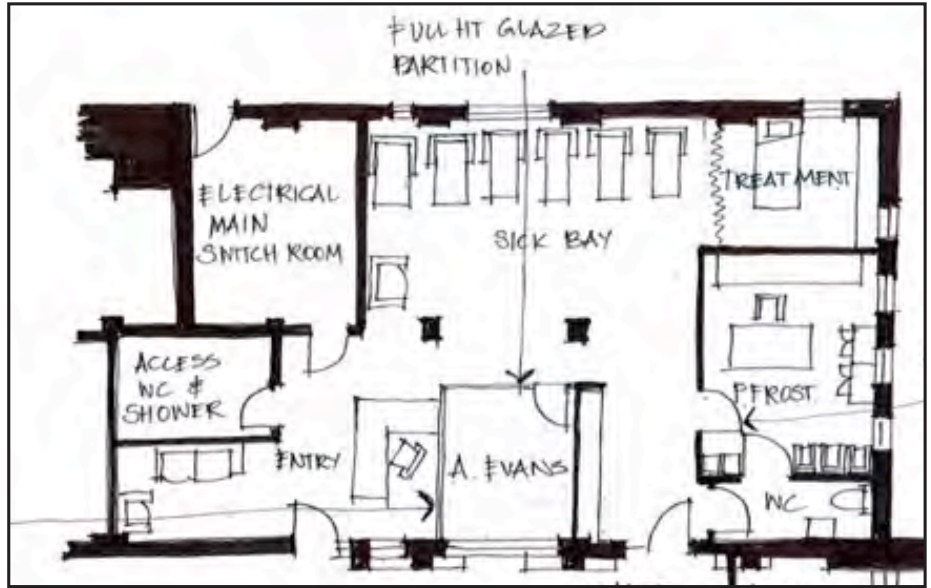
Reminder: Early dismissal Wednesday 24 August

10 parenting habits to develop before your child becomes a teen (continued)

9. Tuck them into bed

Conventional parenting wisdom holds that the first three minutes after kids wake up and the last three minutes before they go to bed are the best times to connect with them. The magic behind bedtime conversations is simple: kids will do anything, even tell you the details of their day, to stay up a little later. Prior to the teen years, this is a great time to catch up with your kid, but it's a habit that should definitely continue as they age. Turns out, teens are just as willing to talk, and there's an even more serious reason why checking in at night should be your habit. If kids are going to start making dangerous choices, the evidence of those habits will be more obvious at night. We have checked in on our kids at night to find that they've snuck their iPads to bed or they're eating junk food after bedtime. More importantly, though, teens are so much more likely to get in trouble, including sneaking out, when they feel like their parents have gone "off-duty" for the night. Checking in reminds them that you're always present.

10. Let them fail (or succeed).

When my son turned 10, we started running together and training for short races. It helped to burn off his pre-teen hormones and jumpstart my 30-something metabolism, but it also gave us another commonality and bonding point. Now, that he is a teenager, he looks forward to our runs (mostly because he is faster than me), but also because it's something special that defines our relationship.

“This is what we do as a family to help others”

I thought you would enjoy this heartwarming email sent by Thomas Carey’s mother last week. As most of you are aware, Thomas lost his twin sister last year to cancer. He vowed to do something positive out of the tragedy that impacted his family. If you recall, Waverley helped by staging the ‘The World’s Greatest Shave’ earlier this year in the Centenary Quadrangle.

Thomas and I recently attended a thank you function for The World’s Greatest Shave at the Queen Victoria building. It was a hard night as I am sure you can all imagine. It brought back to the front of our minds all of the painful memories of the last year. Being around people who like Thomas had been drawn to the Leukaemia Foundation and the shave was also quite empowering as were able to hear other people’s stories and how as well as why they support the foundation.

Thomas was very reluctant to say the least to attend the function for many reasons. Most of this centred around his memories of Elisabeth and the feeling of loss we all still feel on a daily basis. He also was reluctant to attend as he didn’t feel that he had done anything special. To quote Thomas he said “I don’t get the big deal, this is just what you do. This is what we do as a family to help others and this is what Waverley boys do.”

After much debate he did however agree to attend with me. The function was a special event specifically targeted at the top 30 fundraisers in NSW and ACT. These top fundraisers included schools, corporations, groups, clubs and a few select individuals.

As the night proceeded we started to hear other people’s stories of what they had done and why they had decided to shave their heads. It was a privilege to hear people’s stories and their inspiration for this cause. When the formal proceedings of the night started we thought that Thomas would be one of the first award winners but as the numbers dropped and the speaker started to talk about the top 20 then the top 15 fundraisers I remember turning to Thomas and joking that we must have been invited by accident. We both had a quiet giggle at that thought.

When the presenter got to the top 10 fundraisers Thomas said “maybe we are here by accident”. Thomas actually ended up in 9th place across NSW/ACT against clubs, corporations and groups and in 2nd place for the top individual fundraiser in NSW/ACT. When they were reading out Thomas’s story and his inspiration for the shave (Elisabeth) there was not a dry eye in the whole ballroom. The tears flowed even more when the presenter told of how Waverley College had supported and continues to support Thomas. How the boys and the staff had rallied behind him to raise awareness and money for the foundation. One of the images shown on the screen was Thomas and some of the other senior school boys who had shave their heads in support.

At the conclusion of the presentations Thomas was inundated by people who wanted to shake his hand and congratulate him. He had CEO’s of state and

international companies as well as representatives from the various clubs and teams who wanted to talk to him. They told him that he was their inspiration and that he was an amazing young man.

I am writing to all of you to say thank you for everything you did to help Thomas fulfil a promise he made to Elisabeth in August last year. He made his promise to shave his head to raise awareness of leukaemia to Elisabeth on 8 August last year: It was a Saturday and we were all at The Children’s Hospital and it was the first time Thomas had seen Elisabeth since she had been diagnosed. We all had so much hope for the future and the road to recovery had only just started but we were in there together and this was how Thomas had decided to show his beloved twin sister what he could do as part of her healing process.

One year later and life is so very different from everything we had or would ever have imagined. Thank you for all of your support. It has been instrumental to Thomas dealing with Elisabeth’s unexpected death. As we approach the one year anniversary I would like to think that Thomas has been able to start his very long and extremely painful journey of his life without Elisabeth with lots of support from his friends and teachers. Today I received some pictures from the Foundation of the presentation night. I just wanted to share the with you. Thomas knew that he had raised a huge amount of money but we didn’t think in our wildest dreams that his final total would be just over \$25,000. It is still mind blowing to us even now at the total amount he raised. Graham and I thought his original goal of \$1200 was huge.

Thank you for everything you did and continue to do for Thomas and indeed our family.

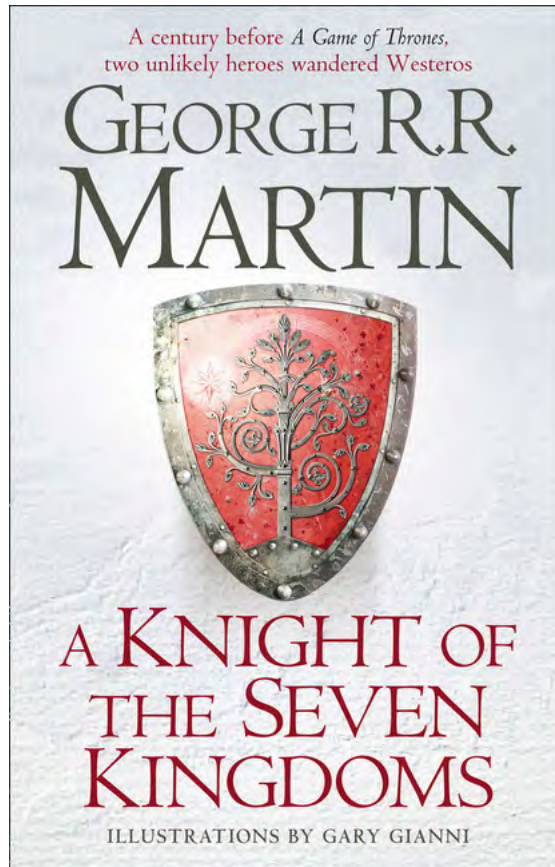

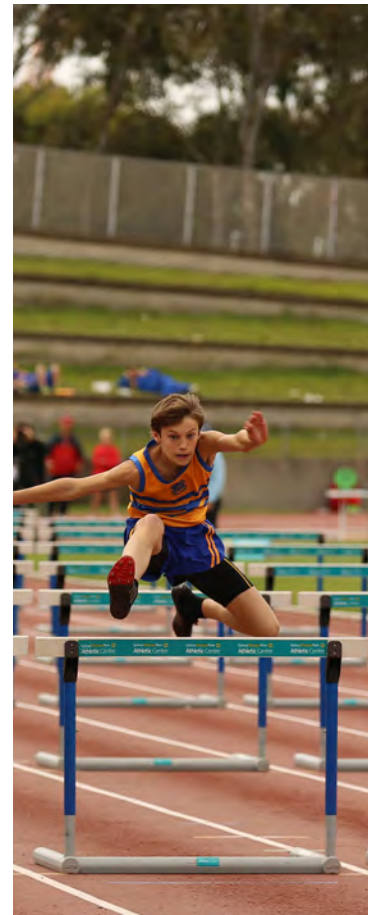

Students wishing to complete undergraduate study in the USA must, as part of their application, supply results from an ACT or SAT exam. The PSAT is a practice test which allows students an opportunity to prepare for these American exams.

The PSAT is designed for students in Years 9, 10 and 11 and gives students the chance to receive feedback about their strengths and weaknesses. The results are not reported to US schools. The PSAT is only given once a year and registration is now open. In 2016 the PSAT will be held on Saturday, October 15th at 8am at St Vincent's College, Potts Point.

The PSAT consists of three areas: Critical Reading; Maths; Writing and Language. The test lasts approximately three hours and a full score report is sent to each student with a breakdown of his/her results.

Registration will close on 9th October or when the test seating is full. The demand for the test has been above capacity for the last several years so I encourage you to sign up early to avoid disappointment.
