UNSW Law Admission Test

UNSW The LAT 2020 will take place on Tuesday 29 September 2020. Standard registrations close at 5:00pm Friday 14 August 2020.

The LAT is a written test that allows candidates to demonstrate their aptitude and skills for studying Law at UNSW. LAT results will be considered in addition to the ATAR (or equivalent academic result) in the UNSW selection process to differentiate amongst the many high achieving Law applicants. Completion of the LAT will enable UNSW to gain a more rounded view of a candidate's capability to study Law; it will also give applicants the opportunity to demonstrate further their suitability for the Law program at UNSW.

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Early Entry to Macquarie University

Macquarie University has announced that they are removing caps on admissions through their early entry schemes, the Macquarie Leaders and Achievers Early Entry Scheme and the Schools Recommendation Scheme.

This means that anyone who applies and meets the criteria will be guaranteed a place to study in 2021. Macquarie has removed these caps to support students concerned about impacts to their study and ATAR results from the COVID-19 Pandemic.

Please note that caps will still exist at course level when there are government, legal, or other logistical restraints (clinical placements, etc).

New UAC EAS Categories

If your family has been affected by COVID-19, you could be eligible for bonus points under UAC's Educational Access Schemes.

Starting in August, you can now be considered through EAS' financial disadvantage stream if your parents have received either the JobKeeper or JobSeeker payments for at least three months.

Early Entry Schemes | Apply now Get an offer for university before you've taken a final exam

Year 12 can be stressful, but the 2020 cohort have probably experienced more than their fair share due to the coronavirus pandemic.

The good news is that everyone understands your pain. Schools, education departments, tertiary admission centres, universities and other tertiary education providers – they're all working hard to make sure that you won't be unfairly disadvantaged because of it.

Receiving an early offer has a few benefits to consider:

Apply for early entry programs NOW

Lots of the early entry schemes are already open for applications, if not they're opening soon. So, if you'd like to apply or you need to do a little research, now is the time.

There are more early offer programs than ever

Early entry schemes are becoming more widespread amongst the alternative pathways offered by universities.

ach uni designs its own scheme, which unfortunately means application systems and requirements will vary.

So it's important that you read all the eligibility requirements, understand the application process, and stick to the key dates listed for each individual program. We have listed all the important information and links to specific pages in our <u>Early Entry Guide</u> to get you started.

Who is eligible to apply for early entry schemes?

Some programs are for gifted students, but not all. If you're not amongst the top academic achievers in your cohort, don't be discouraged.

- · Academic merit
- · Elite athletes and performers
- · Future leaders recognised by your school
- · Students who've thrown themselves in to community engagement and volunteering
- · Rural or remote applicants
- · People who've experienced disadvantage

These are just some of the categories that could make you eligible to apply.

Got questions about Early Entry?

If you have questions about early entry, try reading about some of the <u>frequently asked questions</u> and the answers could help.

You could also reach out to the universities if you've got additional queries about specific programs.

Don't forget that if you're not eligible to apply for any of the schemes right now because:

- · You don't meet the eligibility criteria
- · The university you'd like to apply for doesn't offer early entry

Or perhaps you apply and aren't offered a conditional or guaranteed place....

It's not the end of the world and certainly not the end of your university dreams.

You can still apply for your preferred university and courses later in the year; there are a few main offer rounds you could be successful in.

There are also alternative pathways to explore that could get you into the course you'd like. Just don't give up.

How to become a UX Designer

What do UX Designers do?

It's a UX ("User Experience") Designers job to create easy, efficient, relevant, pleasant experiences for the end-user. UX Design can be applied to any product or service from websites to vegetable peelers, or even a visit to the local supermarket.

If you're practical but creative, have great all-round communication skills and are looking for a job which is fast paced, full of variety and requires lots of human interaction, then a career in UX Design could be really rewarding.

About you:

- · Empathetic, curious and an excellent communicator
- · A critical thinker with a flair for visual design and great analytical skills
- · Collaborates well and has good writing skills with at least a basic understanding of coding

The job:

- · Meet with clients to gain an understanding of their product or service
- · Conduct market and user research
- · Design and develop prototypes/drafts/mock-ups based on user needs
- · Collaborate with Designers and Developers to polish the product ensuring the best experience for end-users
- · Present the final solution to the client and help with its delivery

How to become a UX Designer in Australia

There are no formal qualification requirements to become a UX Designer in Australia and there are many pathways into this career. However obtaining a degree in a related field could jumpstart your career and make you eligible to apply for more senior positions, faster.

Step 1 – Study English and Maths and computer science at high school. Psychology and creative subjects could also be beneficial

Step 2 - Do some reading about UX Design and work out which of the many career options in UX Design would best suit you

Step 3 – Develop your eye for design (not just the visual but *how* processes work and connect) and gain more understanding of human psychology. A good way to make this happen and boost your CV is to get some related work experience.

Step 4 – Check out short courses and degrees in UX or visual design. User Design Experience at RMIT UX/IU Bootcamp at the University of Adelaide User Interface and Experience Design with Open Universities Certificate III in Design Fundamentals at North Metro TAFE Bachelor of Design (Interactive and UX Design) at USC

Step 5 – Create your portfolio (include any mock design projects, blogs, websites etc., that showcase your work and skills), keep it updated. Stay up to date with new trends, user expectations, software, and don't forget to network.

Step 6 – Consider further qualifications to upskill and keep you competitive. E.g. <u>Graduate Certificate</u> of UX and Web Design

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ's)

What is the difference between UX and UI?

They are both elements of the consumer experience. User Interface (UI) Design is all about creating an appealing look or layout, you'll need to understand coding and visual design concepts like colour schemes, fonts etc. Whereas User Experience (UX) focuses on functionality, how the end users will interact with the product or service, how to streamline them to make them easy to use but get a specific job done. The goal being to provide a good or pleasant experience for the end-user.

Do I need to learn programming to become a UX Designer?

No you don't, but knowledge of HTML, CSS, and coding will help you do better in your job and could be advantageous when applying for jobs.

Where do UX Designers work?

UX Designers can work anywhere; in offices, Design firms, with companies who design and produce products and or services of **any** description, financial organisations including banks, large accounting firms etc., Government departments, Museums, or for themselves even working remotely from home.

Do I need to go to university to become a UX Designer?

Not necessarily. Portfolios and work experience probably count more when you're applying for jobs, but relevant qualifications could also work in your favour and help you to get interviews more easily.
