Annual Report Message from Edmund Rice Education Australia NSW Colleges Ltd, CEO / Director of Schools

Waverley College is a highly valued member of the Edmund Rice Education Australia national network of schools which deliver learning through the charism of Blessed Edmund Rice underpinned by the four Touchstones of Liberating Education, Gospel Spirituality, Inclusive Community and Justice and Solidarity. This strong national network consists of 55 schools in every state and territory serving approximately 40,000 students in a wonderfully diverse range of learning communities.

While the unique national network will always be a great asset to our school communities, in 2022 EREA underwent a significant process of reflection and regeneration to ensure best practice governance was in place to enable each school to flourish. From this process, a new governance structure for EREA was born.

On 1 January 2023, EREA NSW Colleges Limited was established to enable more proximate governance for the seven mainstream NSW schools in Greater Sydney, Wollongong and Gosford with 8,552 students and approximately 1,000 staff. The model of a company limited by guarantee was chosen because it is a familiar model of governance both within the Catholic Church in Australia, and in the corporate and civil environment in which EREA schools operate and is seen as a best practice model for corporate governance within education and in the broader not-for-profit sector.

The EREA NSW Colleges Ltd Board has governing responsibility for the schools specifically including ensuring the highest standards of child safety are met, oversight of compliance, staff experience and student experience including teaching and learning.

It has been a great privilege coming into the organisation in 2023 and getting to know the community of Waverley College. I have been very impressed by the young men of Waverley College and their many achievements, the collegiality and professionalism of the staff and the strength of the broader school community.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the many community members who make our schools great places to learn and grow. To our parents, our school leaders, our staff, our advisory council members, our board members, our Old Boys and all the many people who contribute without an official title, thank you for your care, wisdom and generosity of spirit. To our young people in our schools, thank you for providing the energy and inspiration that brings our community together to strive for greater things.

From the Principal

In the College's 121st year of service and commemoration, 2024 again called our community to reflect deeply on who we are, the values we hold, and the role we play in shaping a better future.

Internationally, the world faced continuing turbulence and transition. Donald Trump was elected President of the United States for a second, non-consecutive term, in a campaign that tested democracy and polarised voters. More than 60 nations held elections this year, with many signalling frustration over inequality and the cost-of-living crisis. Humanitarian crises worsened as the war in Ukraine entered its third year, the conflict between Israel and Hamas intensified, and violence in Sudan forced millions from their homes. By mid-year, a record 123 million people worldwide had been displaced by conflict and persecution. The climate crisis became even more urgent as 2024 was confirmed as the hottest year on record, with extreme heat waves, floods and wildfires impacting every continent. These realities reminded us of the global nature of our responsibilities and the importance of action grounded in justice and compassion.

Closer to home, Australia also faced a year of testing events. A searing summer heatwave

saw temperatures soar to record highs across multiple states, reigniting national conversations about climate resilience and infrastructure. Several state elections across the nation reflected shifting public sentiment, while the federal government committed \$400 million to strengthen policing and security cooperation with Pacific neighbours. In December, a Melbourne synagogue was the target of an arson attack, reminding Australians of the importance of standing against antisemitism and hate in all its forms.

Amidst these challenges, Australians also celebrated moments of unity and achievement. Our athletes continued to inspire, with the Matildas building on their 2023 World Cup success in the Paris Olympics and the Diamonds reinforcing their dominance in international netball. Artistic, cultural and scientific innovation thrived, with growing focus on AI and renewable energy technologies shaping Australia's future economy.

2024 marked Waverley College's 121st year of education and service – a year of renewal, innovation, and purpose. Around the world, it was a year that invited us to reflect deeply on our place in a rapidly changing society: advances in artificial intelligence reshaped industries and sparked debate about the future of work; global conflicts continued to remind us of the fragility of peace; and climate action gained renewed urgency as extreme weather events were experienced across Australia and beyond. Amidst these challenges and opportunities, our mission remained clear – to build an inclusive community of mutual trust and respect that values liberating teaching and learning, celebrates curiosity and critical thinking, and nurtures globally-minded citizens.

Guided by this mission and drawing on insights from the NSW Curriculum Reform, our NAPLAN and HSC data, the College's Teaching and Learning Framework, and the EREA National Framework, we identified and

implemented five key strategic priorities that shaped our work in 2024:

Preparing Students as Lifelong Learners and Active Citizens

Through our partnership with AIS and the Designing for Deep Learning initiative, students continued to develop the six global competencies of Character, Citizenship, Collaboration, Communication, Creativity, and Critical Thinking, equipping them for lives of purpose and contribution.

Data-Informed Practice

Staff utilised the TrackOne analytics platform to celebrate growth and provide timely interventions, ensuring every student was known and supported.

Effective Professional Learning

Our professional learning program was restructured to better align with staff needs and strategic goals.

Building a Strong Learning Culture

Learning Checkpoints were introduced on Canvas, strengthening feedback literacy and engaging parents as partners in learning. We also launched the Alumni Award for Academic Integrity and Fortitude, recognising perseverance and grit in academic achievement.

Mastery of Foundational Skills

Literacy and numeracy programs were expanded across key stages, while initiatives like Writer's Toolbox, inferential reading, and academic writing tutorials sharpened students' core skills.

This year we also embraced innovation in teaching practice and digital engagement, running a Tech-Free Week for Years 5–12 to reset learning habits, emphasise focus, and encourage reflection. At the same time, we explored the ethical and effective use of AI in learning, preparing students for a future in which these tools will be ever-present.

Our commitment to **student wellbeing** remained a central focus. In partnership with AIS, we launched a refreshed Wellbeing Framework, aligning programs with best practice and the developmental needs of boys. Highlights included the appointment of a Head of Student Wellbeing, the

introduction of CCC Time (Connection, Culture and Communication), and the implementation of the Kanyini Program for Years 7–9, which invited students to deepen their sense of care, connection, and responsibility.

Throughout the year, students were inspired by an extraordinary range of guest speakers – from Jelena Dokic on resilience and empowerment to Fred Leone and Stan Grant on culture and reconciliation, Gus Worland on mental health, and Jay Steven on courage and recovery. These moments challenged our young men to reflect, act, and grow in empathy and understanding.

The Year 12 motto: 'Stronger Together, United as One' resonated deeply, inspiring each member of our community to strive towards becoming the best version of themselves across all dimensions – cognitive, spiritual, social, emotional, and physical. And certainly assisted in their team approach to the HSC where they celebrated **our highest HSC results in modern times**, including:

- 1st in State in Mathematics
- 7th in State in PDHPE
- Median HSC mark of 81 and 65 Distinguished Achievers
- 30 of 37 courses (81%) above State mean
- Multiple apprenticeships secured across diverse industries

Our enrichment programs thrived: our Year 9 team excelled at the Da Vinci Decathlon, our senior Ethics Olympiad team received honourable mention, and 40 students attended the Oxford University Junior Stretch and Challenge Day. Forty students also travelled to NASA for an immersive STEM experience, reinforcing our commitment to future-focused learning.

The creative and performing arts flourished, with students recognised in HSC Encore, OnSTAGE, and Shape showcases. Our joint production of *Tartuffe* with Ascham and St Clare's delighted audiences, while the European Music Tour gave 56 students the chance to share their talents across five countries.

Faith in Action remained at the heart of College life, with immersions to Cambodia, Timor-Leste, and Fiji, as well as strong

participation in social justice initiatives. Our Walawaani students proudly collaborated with Waverley Council during Reconciliation Week, creating public artworks that celebrated culture and community.

Sport continued to build character, foster teamwork, and inspire excellence. Highlights included national achievements in swimming and surfing, selection of Troy Patea to the Australian Schoolboys Rugby Team, and the launch of a new football partnership with Manchester City.

Our alumni continued to make us proud, with three alumni representing us at the Paris Olympic Games. Noah Havard won Olympic silver in kayaking, Charlie Negus represented Australia in water polo, and Henry Paterson competed in Rugby Sevens. In music, Otis Pavlovic and Royel Otis received four ARIA Awards – a testament to the creative legacy of our graduates.

Looking ahead, 2024 was also a year of planning for the future. The development of our **Strategic Plan 2025–2029**, in collaboration with students, staff, families, and alumni, has provided a clear roadmap across four pillars: Leading Boys' Education, Purposeful Learning, Healthy People, and Enhancing Sustainability.

In our 121st year, we remain united by purpose and inspired by our mission – committed to liberating learning, nurturing character, and empowering young men to act with integrity, compassion, and courage in a complex and changing world.

As we close the year, I extend my deepest thanks to our staff for their dedication and professionalism, to our parents and carers for their trust and partnership, and to our students for their energy, creativity, and courage. Together, you form a community that brings our mission to life each day.

To the Class of 2024, we celebrate you and send you into the world with confidence that you will lead with integrity and compassion. To all students returning in 2025, I challenge you to continue to ask big questions, embrace challenges, support one another, and commit to leaving our College, and the world, better than you found it.

Waverley has developed plans to build a state-of-the-art Science and Innovation Centre as the next stage of the College Master Plan. The College Advisory Council and Leadership Team are committed to this transformative initiative and are seeking EREA approval. The centre will offer a stimulating environment for students to develop future work skills in science, AI and technology, critical thinking, entrepreneurship and innovation.

The Manager of the Waverley College Foundation, Mr Billy Nicolas, is working with Mr Graham Leddie in implementing a capital works fundraising program that includes regular giving, approaches to high-net-worth individuals including supporters, Old Boys and parents/carers,

bequests, naming rights, corporate sponsorships and fundraising events. To date he has raised \$2 million. I encourage you to support this program to build the Science and Innovation Centre.

The spectacular Blue and Gold Ball in the Lacey Gymnasium was a major fundraising event for the College in 2024. Over 700 parents and carers, staff, Old Boys, sponsors and supporters attended this enjoyable and entertaining evening. It raised \$154,000 for our Science and Innovation Centre fund. Thank you for your support.

In conclusion, I would like to thank Mr Graham Leddie, the Leadership Team, Educators and Support Staff for their professionalism and commitment to the College and students. They do an outstanding job. 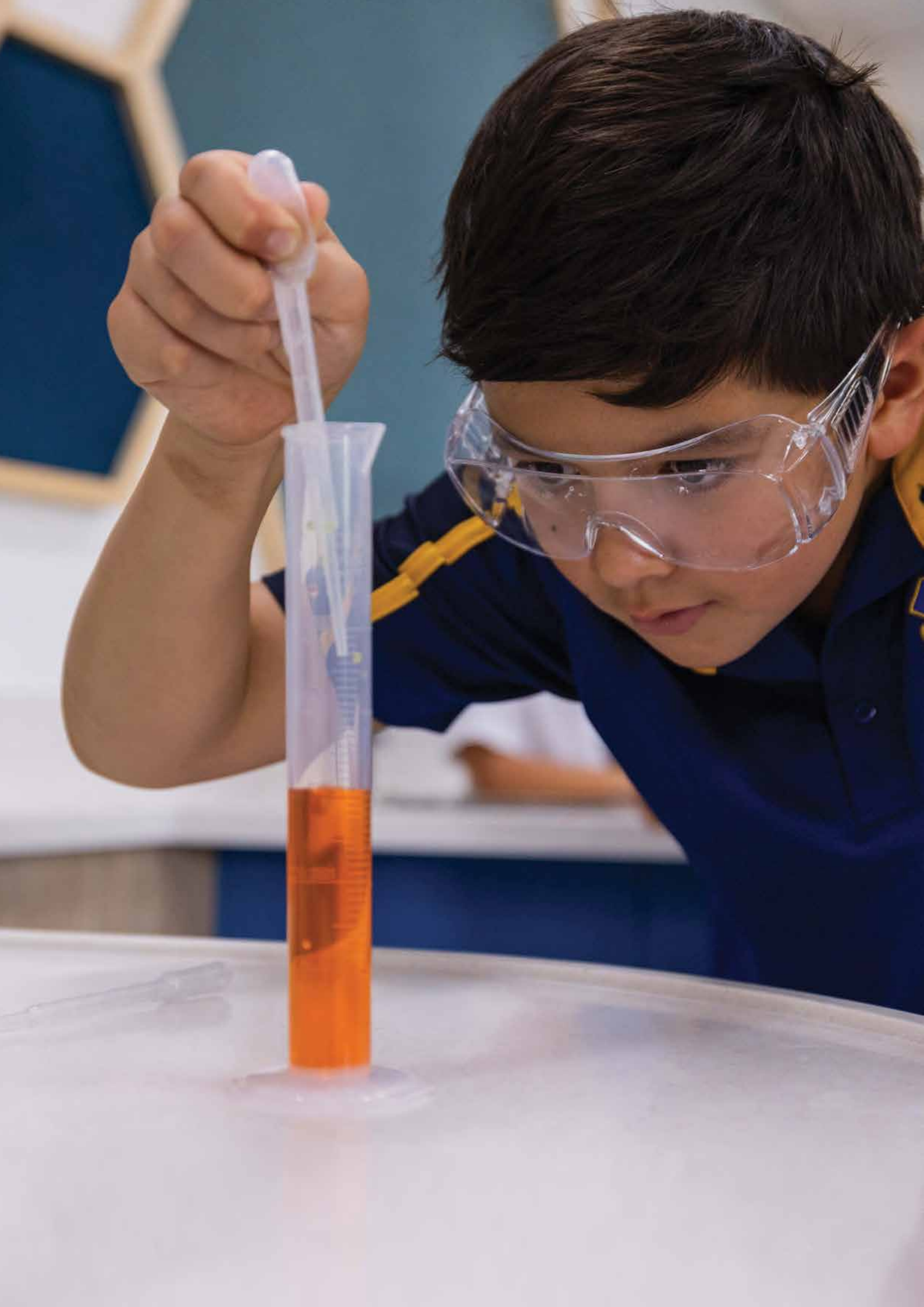

Notable Features: Our adaptation of *Tartuffe* was covered in the Wentworth Courier and Rebecca Gair's work was highlighted in SMH.

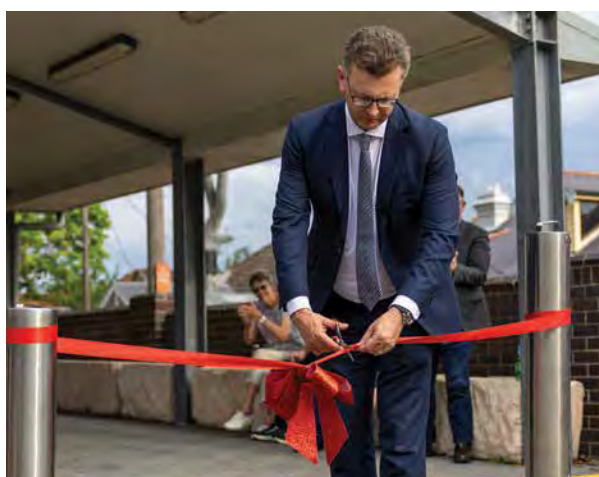

Your parents and carers, grandparents, sisters, brothers, uncles and aunts, have all played a significant role in your journey. Please join me in thanking them on your behalf

And the other significant group worthy of acknowledgement and thanks are your teachers and the support staff of the College. For all the work behind the scenes, for the work upfront and for the work when you weren't at your best... they challenged you to be better.

Please join me in appreciation.

And let's now take a moment to acknowledge one of your peers who passed before his time and I am sure is here in spirit with us all today, Archie. He taught you the power of laughter, the value of friendship, and the strength one can find in facing adversity. Archie's legacy reminds us to appreciate the little things in life and to spread positivity wherever we go.

His unwavering spirit and ability to find joy in every situation serve as a powerful lesson in gratitude and love.

Let's be silent for a moment in remembering Archie.

The education you've received at Waverley College extends beyond textbooks; it's an education in values and in making choices that reflect the best of who you are and who you aspire to be.

Life will present you with moments of challenge and opportunity. Will you choose to be defined by your setbacks, or will you use them as stepping stones to greater achievements or comebacks?

College Captain Address



For the final time, good afternoon, Mr Leddie, members of the College Leadership Team, Staff, Parents, Carers, Grandparents, men of Waverley and of course the graduating Class of 2024.

Days defined by flipping bottles, trading fidget spinners and if you went to the Junior School, playing block cricket and partaking in the infamous jungle run. These fond memories of primary school became a stepping stone for us to Waverley College. I know many of us longed to be older during this time, excited about what high school would be like. At the same time, we were all nervous, hearing stories about older boys and the sheer size of the Senior School which furthered the feeling of a small fish in a big pond.

Our early days in the Senior School were often spent playing Krunker or Minecraft Education in the PAC hallway as we waited for DJ Blenky to arrive for class. We truly got to know each other through early unforgettable experiences like the Year 7 camp and the Year 7 social where we witnessed an epic dance battle between Campbell Porteus and Chloe Smith.

These fond memories were soon lost in the overwhelming chaos that was the COVID-19

pandemic. Having only been at school for just over a year, being forced to learn from behind a screen was a new concept for all. Tashi Doud never failed to join a class in his oodie, and Milan Mann was consistently at the beach during History. Lessons consisted of unanswered questions, staring at peers' profile pictures and the occasional outburst of rage when someone playing Fortnite forgot to mute their mic.

Many of us took part in online Cadets and as all of the 2024 CUOs know, this was not the best reflection of what was to come, namely our SUO Ollie Malzard displaying how not to salute.

One thing that the COVID-19 pandemic taught us was the importance of face-to-face and physical connection, and I believe that this need for connection made our cohort stronger together, and united as one.

After coming out of lockdown, most things returned to normal, if you consider it normal;

wearing a mask for six hours a day, the College getting shut down after one week of on-campus learning, and sport constantly starting and stopping.

We were then able to go on our first Cadet camp, which was memorable, to say the least. Sleeping on the floor, eating out of a ration pack, and hiking from location to location was a foreign experience for most.

It was during this time that many of us began to work toward gaining a leadership position and we started saying "yes." I distinctly remember going to Ms Walsh at the end of a Year meeting and saying, "sign me up for everything." Saying "yes" and being open to new experiences offers an opportunity to develop yourself and those around you to positively impact the broader community.

Someone who embodies this positive impact is Ms Walsh. If you have had the privilege of working with her, whether it's through her Rugby coaching, business class, an

immersion, social justice activity or being a Prefect, consider yourself lucky.

I felt this positive impact when I, alongside 16 peers, were lucky enough to attend the inaugural Fiji immersion. We travelled through the Fijian highlands to find Driamba village nestled in the jungle. I think I speak for all of us when I say that we were truly stepping into the unknown, not knowing what was going to happen each day, and taking things as they came. Despite this, the Fiji immersion was easily the most rewarding thing I, and I'm sure the other boys would agree, have done during our time at Waverley. Days were spent playing volleyball, swimming, painting, teaching about life in Australia and learning about Fijian culture. This immersion truly exhibited the touchstone of 'Liberating Education' and provided each of us with a deeper sense of gratitude. I am sure a similar sentiment can be said for those who went on other immersions. It was only by saying "yes", and completely stepping out of our comfort zones, that we were able to have these unique experiences.

Another moment where I felt this positive impact was the Kairos Retreat. Kairos was an opportunity to learn about others and their story, breaking down stigmas and preconceptions. To those of you who haven't gone on a Kairos retreat, particularly for the Year 10 boys, I implore you to attend. This experience was eye-opening and taught us to focus on the present and not anticipate but participate.

Focusing on the present is something that became most important to me post-COVID and is something that can create a ripple effect of positivity in many areas of your life. Mr Thompson has discussed this idea before, notably in a Basketball video earlier this year, where Hudson Hatched was highlighted as an example of the ripple effect; how small actions can create a broader positive impact. It was also mentioned at a Year 12 meeting, where Oskar Lebard was recognised for his good deeds, earning him the nickname "LeVigelanti" for his efforts to protect the community.

The ripple effect is real. Small acts of kindness can multiply, spreading positivity to others. This effect isn't just external but internal too. When you follow good habits, it becomes easier to tackle major challenges, and each small win builds positive momentum. One of the greatest basketball players of all time, Kobe Bryant once said, "at the end of every day, look yourself in the mirror and ask yourself, did I get better today? If the answer is yes and you do that for 5, 10, 15 years, how much better are you going to be?" Each of you can create your own ripple effect.

This year your Prefects and I have been creating a ripple effect of legacy. I remember the meeting the Captains and I had at the start of the year, we were determined to establish a legacy and feared the adage: "Well what did those Prefects actually do?"

In spite of this, we have certainly done a lot, establishing a foundation for next year's capable leaders to build on.

Everyone has a teacher who has had a positive impact on their life, whether it was pushing you academically, in sport or being there to support your journey. I want all of you to think about who that teacher is for you, and just as Gotcha4Life founder Gus Worland spoke about last week at our R U OK? Day Assembly, let those teachers know that they are special to you and thank them. For me, that teacher was Mr Brophy, he is someone who embodies the notion of being true to yourself, "What is your sacrifice?". Not a lesson went by without this pondering or many more such as "the road to hell is paved with good intentions", "burn gloriously" or "the truth will set you free." Along with this, this Birkenstock-wearing man is someone who truly cared about our success inside and outside of the classroom. Brophy has taught us more than the impact of Joseph Stalin's propaganda or how the North Vietnamese used Dau Tranh to compete against the US.

Our motto this year has been 'Stronger Together, United as One,' and this sentiment has truly defined our cohort. Whether it be in study or social justice, in the pool, on the pitch, the track or even the netball courts. We have truly shown the power of collaboration. I am immensely proud of what our Year has achieved. Together, we've worked not only for individual success but for the collective achievement of our entire community. Our strength in unity can also be seen in our performance last night at CAS Athletics, where despite losing multiple athletes to injuries, we were still able to take home third place and improve on our points from last year.

The relationships we've built have been at the heart of our high school experience. They've given us strength, support, and motivation during both the highs and the lows we faced. As we move on to new chapters in our lives, it's essential that we continue to nurture these connections and remain in touch.

To all of the House Prefects, particularly the House Captains, I thank you for your leadership and effort applied throughout the year. Many of the things this College has experienced this year are a result of your hard work and dedication.

You may remember a video that Mr Leddie showed earlier this Term, it was by renowned inspirational speaker Simon Sinek speaking on courage; "courage is something that comes from relationships, it's external... We have to take time to nurture our relationships because when we are trying to do something different or innovative there will be setbacks and we need people around us to give us courage."

To the Vice-Captains; Asher the thinker, Ricky the realist and Jack the initiator, I thank you for everything you've done, you have certainly given me courage and have had an

immense impact on the College. Whilst we all come from different social circles and have different hobbies and values, I have loved watching our friendship develop over this year. I am honoured to call all three of you my mates, whether it was going to Prefect afternoon teas, having numerous meetings throughout the week, or watching Jack's questionable dance moves, all of you should be proud of what you have done for the College and yourselves.

Thank you also to all of the teachers, your pride in our development is what has pushed each one of us to try our best for every assessment. To all of the Heads of House and mentors, your investment in our individual wellbeing has developed the holistic education all of us leave with today. And to the Support Staff – the librarians, Marketing Team, Media Team, IT, the Campus Team, Ms Ryan and Ms Ball, your contribution to the College and the lives of these young men does not go unnoticed.

Archie's passing in 2020 taught us as a Year group the power of togetherness and unity and I thank you for the support you showed each other during this tough period. Archie legacy has emphasised the importance of authenticity and always being you. I also want to acknowledge Archie's close friends Jordan, Tex, Mitchell, Cormac, Sean, Ed, Drew and Ollie who have championed the Hearts4Arch cause alongside his family to not only raise funds and awareness but celebrate Arch's spirit and impact he had on all of us – thank you.

While sitting where you are over the years, I have listened to each Captain talk about legacy, and for me, our legacy has never been about engraved names on the wall of The Grange, nor plaques or a cup – it has been about the seeds of service and compassion, courage and bravery, virtue and unity, that we have aimed to sew within the fabric of the College.

One final insight I took from last year's 120 year anniversary celebration that I want to end with, is that 'this place' that we call Waverley College has existed long before any of us, and will continue after we pass through. Deep Learning

One of our core strategic priorities is our work on Deep Learning – a framework that supports teachers in providing tools to design engaging and effective opportunities that reimagine learning as, ‘the process of acquiring... six Global Competencies: Character, Citizenship, Collaboration, Communication, Creativity, and Critical thinking.’ [ref: *Dive Into Deep Learning: Tools for Engagement* (Quinn et al., 2019)]. Embedding these competencies into our teaching and learning programs aligns with the vision of the NSW Government curriculum reform to, ‘ensure students develop strong foundations for learning, life and work in a complex and fast-changing world.’ NESA website.

In 2024, we continued to map experiences for students across teaching and learning

programs in all key stages where they learn what these competencies are, how to find evidence of when they demonstrate the competency, how to use the progression tool to measure themselves on their application of the competency and then set goals to progress.

In our Staff Professional Learning Day in October this year, we celebrated the stories of success of purposefully designed Deep Learning programs that were having a positive impact on student learning outcomes. This dynamic session gave our teachers the opportunity to hear about what was working really well in our context with our students and consider what they might implement in their own classrooms. The sessions included examples from a wide range of Key Learning Areas and

learning stages including: Critical Thinking in Year 7 Poetry, Year 5 History and Year 10 History, Communication in Year 6 English, Collaboration in Visual Arts, English and History, Citizenship in Year 7 Mathematics and Literacy and in a Cross Curricular unit in Year 9 PDHPE and Science, and Collaboration in Year 7 PDHPE. At the conclusion of the interactive story sharing sessions, our teachers considered our Teaching and Learning Framework through the lens of these stories. We collated data on which elements of the framework Deep Learning is addressing and which areas should be our focus on the future.

NSW Curriculum Reform

With the ongoing changes of the NSW Curriculum Reform, our faculties dedicated time to preparing for and implementing upcoming changes.

In particular, implementation of new syllabuses in 2024 happened in English and Mathematics for Key Stages 3-5, Languages Key Stages 4-5 and HSC courses in Geography and Software Engineering.

Some of the key elements of this significant curriculum reform is around the ways these new syllabuses can support students in developing the knowledge-based skills and competencies that are in demand for employers and higher education providers. Furthermore, there is a clear focus in the syllabuses of ensuring that students are able to articulate what these competencies are and how they can practise and demonstrate them. The NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) captures this in their challenge to schools to, "ensure every student leaves school well-prepared for a lifetime of ongoing learning and informed and active citizenship and with knowledge, skills and attributes that will help equip them for meaningful work and satisfying careers."

Teaching and Learning Vision and Mission

This has underpinned our Teaching and Learning vision and mission: To build an inclusive community of mutual trust and respect that values liberating teaching and learning, celebrates curiosity, critical thinking and nurtures globally-minded citizens.

Drawn from NSW Curriculum Reform, our NAPLAN and HSC data, our College Teaching and Learning Framework and the EREA Teaching and Learning Framework, in 2024 we identified five key strategic priorities to realise this vision and mission:

- Prepare our students to know how they learn and to graduate as active citizens who have acquired and can articulate key skills. We enacted this through our continued implementation of our work with the Association of Independent Schools (AIS) on Design for Deep Learning.
- Using our data to inform practice and know our students. We enacted this through a series of professional learning

workshops for teachers to use our data analytics suite, Track One, to track student progress, celebrate learning growth and intervene where needed.

- Supporting new staff and ensuring that Professional Learning is effective and meets the needs of all. We enacted this through a review of our staff Professional Learning Plan processes and we built a program of learning for staff tailored to these key priorities and their learning needs.
- Building our Learning Culture. We enacted this through the implementation of Learning Checkpoints on Canvas to support students, teachers and parents

and carers in developing feedback literacy so students are equipped to use formative feedback effectively. We also celebrated learning growth in the introduction of a significant academic growth award in conjunction with our Old Boys' Union: The Old Boys' Award for Academic Integrity and Fortitude.

- Continuing our work in supporting student mastery of foundational skills. We enacted this through the continued implementation of the Writer's Toolbox program, inferential reading in Years 7 and 9, HSC Academic Writing Tutorials, continued implementation of our Numeracy and Literacy study groups and our programming for Literacy skills in mathematics.

Celebration of Lifelong Learning

Percy Watson Award

Dr Percy Watson was a teacher at our College between 1957 and 1969 who inspired his students so much that they established a scholarship named after him to support our teachers, contributing to their postgraduate study. Our teachers at Waverley College work hard to make sure that their practice is as effective as possible. This includes continuous learning on Professional Learning days and, for many, at university with postgraduate study.

The Percy Watson Award celebrates the teachers who received the scholarship in 2023 and the winner was presented at the start of the year at our High Achievers' Assembly. It is always such a difficult decision for the College to award just one teacher, as they all used their further study to contribute to our teaching and learning, wellbeing and spirituality programs. The recipient of the award for 2023 was Ms Cath Lipman who completed her certificate in Religious Education in 2023. Cath's study has supported her work with the Stage 4 and 5 social justice programs and Year 10 Service Week.

EREA Charter Leadership Award

Every year, Edmund Rice Education Australia (EREA) recognises outstanding contributions made by staff members in the service of our school communities in support of the vision and Charter of EREA in the Charter Leadership Awards. From 55 schools across Australia, one of our teachers, Mrs Beverley McCarthy was awarded the Charter award for Liberating Education. Mrs McCarthy, 'encourages young people to strive for excellence and work to the best of their ability. She ensures that students are affirmed and celebrated across a range of strengths and is committed to opportunities for learners to reflect on, evaluate and synthesise ideas. Students are inspired by her determination and proactivity.'



Curriculum

To build an inclusive community of mutual trust and respect that values liberating teaching and learning, celebrates curiosity, critical thinking and nurtures globally-minded citizens.

The Curriculum Directorate in late 2023 collaborated with Heads of Department to develop the above Teaching and Learning Vision Statement. All KLAs in 2024 used this statement to develop their Department Action Plans and then provide a basis for individual staff Professional Learning Plans. Six key priorities were identified and underpinned the direction of all departments across the college.

The first priority to prepare our students to know how they learn, and to graduate as active citizens who have acquired and can articulate key skills, was actioned by continuing to embed Deep Learning in Stages 4 and 5. Cross-curricular collaboration helped to lessen the number of assessment tasks and provide the opportunity for deeper engagement. Students were supported to learn how to measure their acquisition of global competencies and set goals using the student friendly Deep Learning Progressions. Departments mapped the 6 Global Competencies and targeted appropriate ones to embed in Stage 4 and Stage 5 units of work. In addition, the Learning Checkpoints on Canvas that include student self-reflection and goal setting using the Deep

Learning Progression were reviewed and applied appropriately.

The priority to use data to inform practice and know our students was the focus of a Data Focus Group that worked effectively to learn how to use data such as Trackone and PSAM to also develop this skill in other staff. This helps parents and students to track progress and in the case of Year 12 students have an understanding of what ATAR to expect and to address any issues with their under-performing subjects.

Other priorities included to continue working with supporting student mastery of foundational skills, building our Learning Culture and working more closely with the Heads of House Directorate to ensure that learning occurs in places of respect, safety and trust.

The Curriculum Directorate also continued to embed Study Skills into Stages 4 and 5 formative tasks reinforcing strategies from Dr Prue Salter's parent and student information sessions. The aim is to make sure that students are actively taught how to learn, set goals and use AI software with integrity.

AI continues to challenge the setting and marking of assessment tasks and an AI Focus Group was established to map and plan for future use of this emerging and rapidly-developing technology.

The Curriculum Directorate also managed a range of external assessments including NAPLAN and Allwell testing and the use of data to help teachers know their students better and plan accordingly. Long term curriculum strategies were further developed such as the extension of the Inferential Reading Program and Writer's Toolbox in Years 5-8. HSC Literacy Workshops and ongoing Year 12 Tutorials further helped to support and prepare our students for HSC Examinations.

The Curriculum Team continues to prepare for the NSW Curriculum Reform with a number of Key Learning Areas creating teaching and learning programs for new curriculum implementation in 2025 and beyond.

Innovation

This year we have seen innovative growth within the teaching pedagogies of Waverley teachers, support teachers and within our students. This year was our fourth year of using the learning management system of CANVAS. Further to this, within innovation, a working group participated in developing our Formative Tasks, embedding Deep Learning and the range of different styles of formative tasks in a key learning area or on Canvas. This year we changed the naming convention of Formative Tasks to Learning Checkpoint. As we came to the conclusion that the formative tasks within CANVAS were more of a checkpoint on students progress and where real - time reporting was needed. Restructuring the formative tasks to be a Learning Checkpoint, has helped to develop our students feedback literacy, but also to have timeline check in for timely feedback as they progress towards their summative assessments.

Along with our Real Time Reporting and Learning Checkpoints, this year we implemented our Data Analytics program - TrackOne Data. Our data analytics program takes in the students External Results, Summative Assessments, Grade Point Average and pastoral care data to help us teachers, Heads of Department and Heads of House best support our students progress in academics and in pastoral care. This program has already seen positive results with helping to tailor our teaching and learning to best suit our students and helping teachers to best inform our practices.

This year was focussed on student progress and how to best tailor their learning. We look forward to this implementation and growth in the next few years.

Academic Enrichment

This year, through extensive consultation with our College community, we expanded our program to include family information nights where we gathered with our College community to share the theory and research that underpin our Enrichment program, to help us build a rigorous learning culture that supports all of our students.

Over the past year, both students and parents/carers have gained valuable insights into our ethos, particularly in designing a curriculum for high-potential learners. Like all schools, our journey toward excellence is ongoing, and these opportunities to engage with our community play a vital role in shaping and strengthening our academic culture.

Aligning with the EREA touchstone, inclusivity, we ambitiously expanded our program beyond our enrichment curriculum this year to offer 44 students the opportunity to travel to the US Space and Rocket Center to attend Advanced Space Academy in Huntsville, Alabama. This unique opportunity allowed our students to train like astronauts at one of the world's premier aeronautical facilities, offering an unforgettable experience that combined education with hands-on exploration. One of our enrichment students reflected, "I learnt a lot of things that are not taught in our classrooms at school, including the history of human

space exploration, how rockets work and the different elements involved in space travel. The main thing that we will probably never get to do in a regular classroom was building (and testing!) the miniature rockets. Being able to make your rockets out of cardboard and a powerful motor was wonderful, but the truly amazing part was being able to watch the rocket that you had designed and created fly high into the air, and then deploy a parachute and glide safely to the ground." Another student considered the trip "a life changing experience for me as I learnt a lot of things like being responsible, interacting with new people, managing a schedule, buying my own food, etc which has given me a different perspective on life as a whole. The fact that I learned so much about aeronautics and had so many genuine conversations with my mates truly made it an unforgettable, once in a lifetime experience."

Enriching student learning both in the classroom and through opportunities such

as academic competitions and international training programs provides our students with a diverse range of experiences that significantly contribute to their personal and academic growth. These activities foster experiential learning, allowing students to engage in real-world challenges that cultivate critical thinking and problem-solving skills. Participating in competitions and travelling internationally helps students develop resilience and adaptability, essential components of strong character. Additionally, these experiences encourage collaboration as students work with peers from various backgrounds, enhancing their teamwork abilities. Moreover, these opportunities instill a sense of citizenship, as students gain a broader understanding of global issues and cultural diversity, ultimately shaping well-rounded individuals prepared to make meaningful contributions to society.

Highlights of 2024

Digital Hub:

Our dedicated Careers website (www.waverleycollegecareers.com) serves as a central resource for students and families, offering a wealth of information on post-school options, including university courses, vocational training, apprenticeships, and gap year programs. Students can access interactive tools, videos, and personalised assessments to guide their exploration. They can also create customised resumes and cover letters, career plans and develop an online digital portfolio.

In addition, weekly newsletter and email updates are provided to students regarding tertiary institution Open Days, new courses, career ideas, apprenticeships and study tips.

Personalised Support:

Year 12 students received individualised guidance through one-on-one interviews with the Careers Coordinator throughout the year. These sessions focused on clarifying career aspirations, exploring suitable pathways, and navigating university applications, TAFE courses, and alternative options. The range of advice includes university and TAFE courses, ATAR scores, bonus points, early entry schemes, resume writing, apprenticeship pathways and identifying potential employers.

Industry Insights:

In June, all Year 12 students attended the HSC and Careers Expo at Moore Park. The Expo provided Year 12 students with valuable exposure to a wide range of industries and educational institutions. Students engaged with representatives from universities, TAFE, the Defence Force, and private colleges, gaining first hand insights into various career paths. Many students returned to the Expo with their parents/carers over the four-day event. Parents/carers and students in Years 10 and 11 were also encouraged to attend.

Celebrating Trade Pathways:

Our Trade Careers Information Night was held on 11 June 2024. More than 90 senior students from Years 7-12 and their parents/carers attended the event. The evening showcased the success of Old Boys who have established thriving businesses in various trades. Students and parents/carers heard inspiring stories from:

English

We kept memory alive. Ensured it meant something.
So that what happened before our time would not be forgotten.

The above lines are from Tim Winton's new dystopian novel *Juice*. The text paints a bleak picture of a potential future in which we have not addressed the problems facing our world; problems such as climate change, inequality and prejudice. These lines, however, suggest hope: if we recognise the problems we face, we may be able to confront them. They also imply the role that the reading and writing of literature may have in this enterprise; it is a means of communicating our world's issues, a way of campaigning for social justice, a way of prompting and promoting empathy and understanding.

Indeed, it is this function of reading and writing as a call to social action that seems to have featured prominently in English this year at Waverley College. The writing of our students, most notably that of Extension Two Yr 12 students Asher Thomasyu, Robbie Muir and Ewan McDonald, was imbued with an acute sense of social conscience: it tended to deal with the spectre of past, but did so in a way that suggested forgiveness, understanding and a way forward. The incredible essays and speeches of Asher, James Medland and Year 11 student James Peate, who competed in the inaugural Edmund Ignatius Rice essay and public

speaking competition, all revealed the sense of curiosity, intellect and social justice at the heart of Waverley's students' thinking and writing. College incursions, such as those provided by Aboriginal storyteller Monty Boori Pryor and by Bell Shakespeare—also required students to consider the way narrative compels them to engage in their wider world.

HSIE

The Human Society and Its Environment (HSIE) department had another remarkable year in 2024, with a strong focus on real-world learning experiences.

Students in Year 10 Commerce took on the challenge of decorating the Centenary Quad with creative marketing materials to promote their stalls for our annual Market Day event. Throughout the day, students gained valuable business and financial management skills, experiencing both the rewards and risks of entrepreneurship. Their efforts helped raise money for R U Ok Day, reinforcing the importance of mental health awareness alongside financial literacy. Year 9 Commerce students participated in an excursion to Bondi Junction, where they engaged in comparison shopping to develop a practical understanding of marketing strategies, pricing techniques, and consumer decision making. This experience allowed students to apply theoretical knowledge to real world scenarios, enhancing their financial literacy and analytical skills.

Year 11 Business Studies students demonstrated their entrepreneurial skills by developing and pitching business plans in a Shark Tank-style assessment, while Year 12 Legal Studies students visited the Downing

Centre Courts to gain firsthand insight into legal processes and court proceedings. HSIE's newest subject, Society and Culture, saw Year 12 students complete a major work exploring a diverse range of topics, including conspiracy theories, masculinity, and inclusivity in sport, rise of secularisation in Australia and many more. Their projects showcased critical thinking, research skills, and deep analysis of contemporary social issues. These valuable skills will support students in their future studies and equip them to engage critically and thoughtfully as global citizens.

For our Geographers, our students in Year 7 embraced their roles as environmental stewards through the Religion and Geography Deep Learning initiative, which encouraged sustainable practices and addressed the challenges of waste reduction, fast-fashion, overconsumption and the issue of plastic on the environment. Alongside this, students had the opportunity to participate in fieldwork at Bantry Bay, where they examined landscape shaping processes and a range of interactions with the environment. Year 9

students examined coastal sand dunes and assessed the effectiveness of management strategies at Malabar Headland, while Year 11 conducted biophysical studies at North Narrabeen, focusing on coastal processes and interactions. Year 12 students delved into the impact of urban renewal at Barangaroo, examining its effects on both the environment and the community.

These enriching experiences were made possible by the dedication and commitment of the HSIE teaching team. This year, we were delighted to welcome new staff members, including Linda Griffin, Niamh Ennis, Alison Fullam, and Nathan Brown, who have brought fresh perspectives and expertise to the department.

We look forward to another dynamic and engaging year of teaching and learning in 2025 in HSIE at Waverley College.

HSIE History

In many ways 2024 brought with it curriculum revitalisation and pedagogical innovation for the History faculty. Across Years 8-12, evidence-based findings from educational research into History education was implemented into all courses with respect to assessment task design and outcomes; a focus on literacy; specific skills linked to research findings from Canada, North America, Germany and Sweden; and, connections with the wider community through the visit by Courage to Care in conjunction with a depth study of the Holocaust in Year 10. These were achieved through alignment with Deep Learning competencies across Years 8-10.

The Faculty continued to utilise CANVAS in terms of providing resources, lessons and real time reporting to parents/carers through both Formative and Summative assessment tasks. This was supplemented with the use of Writer's Toolbox to ensure a connective approach to the development of literacy with specific focus on sentence types and paragraph models. These, in turn, were differentiated across the junior years and into the senior cohort. What also became evident was the manner in which enrichment students in Year 8 embraced Deep Learning, Writer's Toolbox and sought to continually

enhance their skills in analysis, interpretation and written composition.

The number of students who choose to study senior History as a result of their experiences across Years 8-10 remains pleasing and indicates the enthusiasm and expertise their teachers bring to the subject. The consolidation of History Elective in both Years 9 and 10 further substantiates student interest continuing in this subject. Faculty staff undertook professional development and presented at the EREA conference as well as at staff days in terms of collaboration

and assessment task design and evaluation. All Faculty underwent and evaluated their own individualised Professional Development Plans.

Finally, all of this needs to be placed within the context of the continual support from the College Leadership Team, especially Mr Graham Leddie (Principal) and Ms Lynsey Porter (Deputy Principal – Teaching & Learning).

Waverley also scored almost 6 points above the state mean for Spanish. This was a fantastic result and a credit to both the teachers and students for their dedication and application in 2023 *iFelicidades!*

Our Year 8 students enjoyed exploring the language and cultural differences within the Hispanic world. There were some standout highlights this year, including our footballer signing assessment task, the paella and churros incursion, the Spanish football team points class system, and our restaurant skit speaking task. We hope Year 8 will fondly remember the engaging mini cultural units we critically explored. Students immersed themselves learning about the rich traditions and practices of San Fermin, *La Tomatina* and *Día de los Muertos*.

Year 10 did not miss out either! They really enjoyed writing a children's book for one of their assessments and a holiday brochure, as a latin american travel tour company. Year 10 undertook a Spanish Film Festival viewing in class and analysed Spanish slang and how culture influences cinema and humour. Students also teamed up with hospitality

students to cook some *deliciosas* Colombian empanadas. Students really enjoyed pushing themselves out of their comfort zones and really forming a great vocabulary to communicate in Spanish on a wide range of topics.

Year 10, 11 and 12 classes were lucky enough to spend an afternoon at a local Mexican restaurant where they all were "forced" to communicate ONLY in Spanish. This was a really fun afternoon, where the boys pushed themselves to communicate by asking questions or giving answers with each other and the restaurant staff. Learning Support

The Learning Support Program provides students the opportunity to access the curriculum and all programs in our school community. We are inspired by Edmund Rice to, “give particular attention to young people who might otherwise be excluded or rejected ... to create a Safe and Inclusive Learning Community” (EREA Touchstone). These supports allow for the diverse range of students to feel more connected and valued, as their authentic selves, and leads to better academic, mental health and social outcomes.

An increasing number of students and families are reaching out to the Learning Support team as they see the benefits of adjustments in classroom and assessment settings. In some cases, students access support to accommodate their needs for a short period of time.

Adjustments take many different forms and may include direct intervention with a Learning Support teacher or assistant, subject teacher or peer support, as well as, adjustments to physical facilities/resources, learning and assessment materials and courses. The Learning Support Team works with other school support services, such as the school psychologists, nurses and the Wellbeing Team to deliver a multi-faceted approach.

This year, an additional Junior School teacher assistant has been put in place to provide individualised instruction, and to assist with student management. Support is provided to students settling into school with socialisation, following school routines and managing the academic workload.

In recent years, we have heard the call from the NSW Department of Education for effective explicit teaching methods—evidence-based programs. We draw from

the EREA Learning Statements on Liberating Pedagogies and Liberating Learning Design to inform us to keep our practices engaging and outcomes focused. Our students benefit from specifically scripted and sequenced Direct Instruction teaching programs. Meta-analyses of 50 years of research shows, “All the estimated effects were positive, and all were statistically significant.” (Stockard, et al. 2018).

A high level of student involvement, positive reinforcement and regular testing and review are key features of our programs. Our approach is consistent, whether it is in Learning Support small group lessons, team teaching or supporting classroom teachers. For instance, the use of dynamic teaching strategies with frequent engagement of student voice throughout lessons; the phonological loop being key to moving student learnings to long-term memory, and reducing cognitive load, allowing for further deep learning experiences.

“Direct instruction is good teaching ... it’s good for disadvantaged kids, it’s good for high achieving kids. It’s the only thing that works for low progress learners. Great teachers can deliver effective instruction to a few kids, but the magic is when you are able to do it to all kids ... every child.” (Pearson, 2024).

Our team is acknowledged for their commitment to students and families throughout 2025: Ms Helen Chia, Ms Madeline Eddy, Ms Michelle Richardson, Mr John McCoy, Ms Laura McLarnon, Ms Jennifer Micallef and Ms Deanne Seamons.

Finally, in 2024 we farewell Ms Margaret Fitzgerald who joined the Waverley College Learning Support team in 2015. We thank Margaret for sharing her expertise, particularly her in-depth knowledge of instructional design and engaging delivery of Direct Instruction reading and spelling programs. In an admirable teaching career, Margaret has been the recipient of the NSW Government Quality Teaching Award and is published in the area of teacher development and monitoring. We wish Margaret the best for her future endeavours.

Library

2024 was another exciting year in the library. Our continued collaboration with our Literacy Coordinator and across all faculties continues to build and inspire.

One new highlight of this was the stellar Parent / Son / Staff Book Club event late in November. During 2024 we initiated a new collaboration with our Visual Arts faculty where all boys received targeted literacy and research skills centred around the great annual Archibald Art Prize.

Students were supported and taught explicitly on how to find articles via dedicated databases and then how to effectively take notes to build deep comprehension.

Some other highlights for us were our Big Issue outreach program where selected classes were able to be part of a presentation from people in our community with lived experience of homelessness. Students then consolidated insights gained by having dedicated reading lessons from the *Big Issue* magazines we subscribe to in the library.

We collaborated with Waverley Council to participate in NSW Law Week taking a Legal Studies class to a criminal law seminar at Waverley Council Public Library. The

students were engaged by a Legal Aid community solicitor.

We continued to engage students through targeted displays. I thank my library team for some great displays.

Once again we took a group of students to the Sydney Writers' Festival. The students gained knowledge and key insights from the sessions on aspects of the craft of writing for both the fiction and nonfiction literary styles.

Years 8 and 9 were treated to a performance poetry presentation from Zohab Zee Khan – spoken word poet whilst on his international tour. This was in celebration of National Book Week and to support our new Year 9 Semester 1 library literacy reading program. Zohab, who we were fortunate to have attend the College as he is based in London and was heavily booked, was a 2012 Australian Poetry Slam NSW Finalist, 2014 Australian Poetry Slam Champion and 2014 International Poetry Slam in Madrid Runner Up.

In 2024 we revamped our HSC section. Clearer signage and grouping all standard subjects together were some of the enhancements, as was breaking up the collection into Preliminary and HSC in separate sections. We thank the senior boys for their input on this.

The library continues to engage with contemporary and pressing trends in the education space. In light of this, I have been an active member of the College's newly formed AI Focus group and will continue to support and advocate for safe, effective and targeted use of AI. I know that in a library context AI is being used as an aid to selecting your next book to read and as a research assistant bot. As we move forward in this space, ensuring we meet privacy requirements, countering bias and fostering student agency and effort will be areas we look forward to facilitating.

Literacy

"In our reading, we are enriched by what we receive from the author, allowing us to grow inwardly so that each new work we read will renew and expand our worldview." – Pope Francis, Letter 'On the role of Literature in Formation'.

Inspired by these words, 2024 has been a year of growth, innovation, and accomplishment for our Literacy program. Through an array of events and initiatives, we have continued to cultivate a love of reading and writing within the Waverley College community, fostering empathy, imagination, and critical thinking.

Reading

Our Reading Program for Years 7 to 9 remains at the heart of our efforts, creating lifelong, habitual readers who recognize the power of literature to unlock understanding and prepare them for a complex world. By reading, students learn to value nuanced thinking and confidently engage with ideas, knowing that not all questions have simple answers.

This year, our attendance at the Sydney Writers' Festival proved to be a pivotal experience for Year 11 and 12 students, offering deep insights into the art of storytelling and writing. Kate Rossmannith, an author, essayist, and Associate Professor at Macquarie University, introduced students to the dynamic genre of creative nonfiction, emphasizing the importance of research, the genesis of ideas, and the iterative process of editing. Her book, *Small Wrongs*, served as an example of how to ask the questions that need to be asked in the pursuit of authentic storytelling.

Melissa Lucashenko, a celebrated Bundjalung nation writer, shared the cultural and personal significance of storytelling, drawing inspiration from her acclaimed novel *Edinglassie*. She encouraged students to embrace their unique writing styles, whether as "Plotters" who structure their work meticulously or "Pancers" who write spontaneously. In the final session,

poet Maxine Clarke and teen poet Solli Raphael captivated the audience with their discussions on the expressive potential of free verse poetry. Raphael's performance of *Free Your Mind* encouraged students to see poetry as a powerful tool for addressing social concerns and to find their authentic voices.

On 20 November, the Literacy and Library teams hosted our first-ever Literary Evening and Waverley College Community Book Club, bringing the Waverley College community together to celebrate reading and writing. We were delighted to have Mrs Lynsey Porter officially open the event. Special guest Paul MacDonald shared profound insights into the relationship between passionate reading and skilled writing. Extension 2 English students Asher Thomasyu and Robbie Muir reflected on how literature has shaped their academic and personal lives, offering thoughtful reflections on its transformative potential. Our first book club novel, *Before the Coffee Gets Cold* by Toshikazu Kawaguchi, provided

a perfect launchpad for discussion and demonstrated the power of literature to bring people together. We extend heartfelt thanks to parents, students, and staff for making the evening a resounding success.

This year, staff and Year 12 students took on the role of "Guest Readers" for Years 7 and 8, embodying our motto, "Everybody has a Book." These sessions featured texts such as *The Rabbits*, *Banjo Paterson* poetry, *Holes*, *Azaria*, and *Scar Town*. Their contributions reinforced the importance of strong reading role models, reshaping perceptions of reading as both valuable and enjoyable. Research from the International Boys' Schools Coalition highlights the critical role of such initiatives in fostering a positive reading culture, particularly among boys.

We also congratulate Rory Muldowney, Medal Award recipient in the *Premier's Reading Challenge*, an acknowledgment of his dedication to reading and literacy excellence.

Writing

In 2024, we continued expanding the *Writer's Toolbox* program, emphasizing fluency, precision, and flair in writing. This year's Literacy Mathematics Assignment encouraged students to broaden their perspectives during their 2024 Cambodia Immersion. Students in Years 7 and 8 completed reflective writing tasks while Year 10 students contributed their voices to discussions, promoting gratitude and global awareness.

Our students' remarkable writing talents were showcased in competitions throughout the year. Gabriel Wright's compelling narrative

earned him the Junior Short Story category award in the Lionel Bowen Young Writers Competition, while Samuel Altree-Williams received a Highly Commended distinction in the Senior Poetry category for his expressive verse. In The Beast Writing Competition, Xavier Wright's poem *The Beauty of Bondi* won first place, and Alex Avdalis's Ode to the Season achieved second place. These accolades reflect the strength of our writing program and the dedication of both students and staff.

As we close another successful year, we remain inspired by the transformative

power of reading and writing. In 2025, we aim to expand our Reading Program and Book Club further, continue integrating literacy strategies across all faculties, and foster confidence in reading and writing as the ultimate goal. As Pope Francis reminds us, literature has the power to enrich our worldview. With this in mind, we look forward to another year of growth, connection, and creativity.

PDHPE

The PDHPE Department for 2024 consisted of Mr Stephen O'Donnell, Mr Matthew Barr, Mr Scott Coleman, Ms Kaitlyn Downey, Ms Rebecca Gair, Mr Samuel Douglas, Mr Tom Kennedy, Mr Greg Elliott, Mr Ben Shorthouse, Mr Lachlan Drew-Morris, Mr Jack Wachtel, Mr Jeremy Roff, Mr Matthew Johnston, Mr Fionn O'Shea and myself. I sincerely thank each one of them for delivering the curriculum so professionally, energetically, and innovatively.

In 2024 the PDHPE department focused on the holistic learning approach in physical education lessons, which has been found to improve the cognitive learning ability in students. Interventions in PE, such as a game sense approach to practical lessons, can make a positive difference to student learning and development. Moreover, these benefits extend across four domains: cognitive, affective, psychomotor, and social with PE interventions improving student outcomes.

Results from the 2023 PDHPE HSC Examination were very strong, with the students in PDHPE once again achieving above the State average. More than 63% of the students who sat the HSC in PDHPE achieved a 'Band 5 or 6' result. Enrolment in PDHPE across NSW continues to grow with this year's HSC revealing a record 17,539 students studying PDHPE, up 20 per cent in a decade. Next year, 2025, will be the final year that students sit the HSC exam for PDHPE with the introduction of the new Stage 6 (Years 11 and 12) Health and Movement Science (HMS) syllabus starting in Year 11. Health and Movement Science is an integrated course that provides students with opportunities to develop and apply their knowledge, understanding, and skills of health and movement concepts.

Another focus for 2024 was the implementation of 'Deep Learning' into the design of our Stages 4 and 5 PDHPE learning programs. Deep learning is a process of acquiring the six global competencies needed for students to flourish as life-long learners. It includes a set of student educational outcomes such as the acquisition of robust core academic content using real-life problem solving, higher order thinking skills, learning dispositions and self-reflection.

This year the Year 9 PDHPE and Science departments have collaborated to develop a Teaching and Learning unit that supports students to develop the Global Competency of Citizenship as a part of the Deep Learning process. The goal of the unit was to develop the competency of 'citizenship' as students learn to break down barriers and discuss the issues facing young adults in understanding consent and sexual health practices to encourage respectful relationships and health awareness. The PDHPE department supported the school's focus on tech-free days and weeks. Tech-free aims to improve study habits and wellbeing, while also shifting the balance from laptops being the default, to using more handwritten notes. PDHPE students use their workbooks in PDHPE

theory lessons that incorporate a wide range of different pedagogical approaches.

The end of this year will see Mr Greg Elliott leave the Waverley College PDHPE Department. Having taught at Waverley College since 2016, Greg's passion for teaching and boys' education will be a big loss for the Department. Greg has held the position of Acting Sports Master, Convenor of Cricket and 1st XI Cricket Coach. On behalf of the College community, I wish Greg all the best for the future – he will be missed.

I would like to sincerely thank the following people within the College community for their support towards the Department. These include the Principal, Mr Graham Leddie, Deputy Principal – Teaching and Learning, Mrs Lynsey Porter, Mr Simon Potter and the members of the IT Department, front office staff, and all the staff in the Maintenance Department.

The PDHPE Department looks forward to working successfully with the College community again in 2025.

Science

Science fuels curiosity and drives meaningful innovation, equipping students with the tools to transform the world around them. In 2024, the Science department focused on enhancing opportunities for students to apply the scientific method and explore global issues by fostering deeper connections between the classroom and the broader scientific community.

Samuel Aintree-Williams (Year 10) was selected for an internship at the University of Sydney Electrical Engineering Department where he dove into life as a university student. Samuel attended graduate-level lectures given by leading researchers on electric machines and drives, undertook experiments using large synchronous motors to test hypotheses, and toured the snowy hydro office in the city, which demonstrated the workings of this technology and its effectiveness in providing renewable energy to Australians.

As part of the Aeronautical Engineering module, Year 12 Engineering Studies students took to the skies to experience first-hand, the intricate world of aerodynamics. Rather than merely studying theories in textbooks, we took an immersive approach and provided the opportunity for our Year 12 students who are studying aeronautical engineering to undertake a flying lesson. Although it was only a small propeller aircraft, the opportunity to take the controls and feel the forces of flight firsthand was an unparalleled educational experience.

Forty students from Years 7 to 9 had the unique opportunity to attend the prestigious Oxford University Junior Stretch and Challenge Day, hosted at ASCHAM School. This event was designed to inspire and meet the unique needs of highly capable students, encouraging them to think critically and push the boundaries of their academic potential. Oxford University's Ms Julie Arliss guided the students through four sessions that revolved around empowering bright minds to adeptly navigate ideas and establish connections across various academic disciplines including; Genetics, Epigenetics, and the ethical implications of transhumanism

Our Year 10 Science and Engineering Challenge Team were awarded Champion

School as they competed against six other schools in a number of tasks to recognise the scientific and problem solving skills required for society to function such as powering a city, engineering a bridge, building earthquake proof towers and designing the most efficient fish trap.

Our Year 12 Marine Studies students successfully completed their PADI Open Water Diving Certification, developing skills such as buoyancy, and rescue skills during their dives at Camp Cove and around Bare Island. They then put their practical skills into action as they spent 5 days on the magnificent Lady Elliot Island, a coral cay in the southern Great Barrier Reef. The students snorkelled and scuba dived with a variety of rays, sharks, turtles, fish and corals - observing the intricacies of the marine ecosystem.

Science Week at Waverley College was a great success, filled with exciting events, engaging talks, and class based activities that sparked curiosity and a deeper appreciation for science among students. Held from Monday, 12 August to Friday, 16 August, the week featured a range of activities aimed at exploring different fields of science, with guest speakers, challenges, and interactive experiences.

Ian Storie (OB) shared his career journey, spanning engineering companies, CSIRO and a start up company he began, highlighting the importance of problem-solving, innovation, and perseverance in the profession. With a wealth of experience in various fields of Science Ian's engaging presentation introduced students to the vast possibilities in engineering, from designing desalination solutions to developing cutting-edge bee recognition technology. Ian's talk left students feeling inspired to explore how they, too, could contribute to the world of science.

Claire Petite (Waverley parent) a veterinarian, delivered an insightful presentation on the fascinating world of veterinary science. Claire discussed the vital role veterinarians play in ensuring the health and well-being of animals, and how students may enter the exciting field of Veterinary medicine. She also

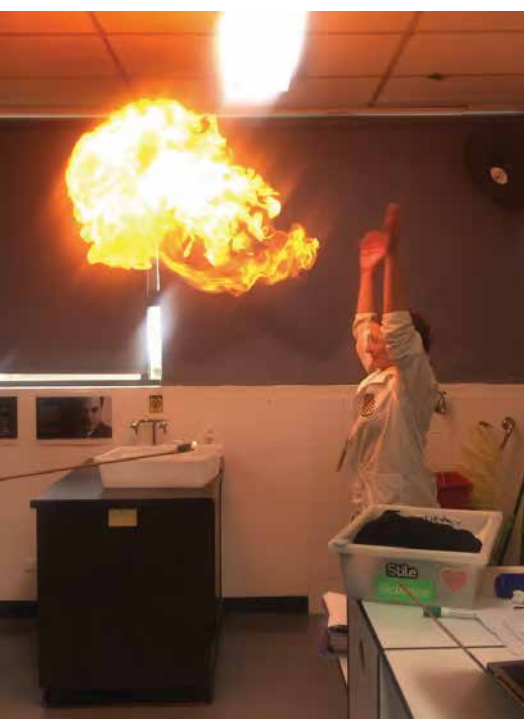
shared personal anecdotes from her career, offering students a glimpse into the day-to-day challenges and rewards of working with animals. Her talk was particularly popular with students passionate about animal care and biology.

For Year 7 and 8 students, the highlight of the week was an exhilarating science show from Fizzics Education. From explosive chemical reactions to mind-bending physics demonstrations, the show captivated students and made complex scientific concepts accessible and enjoyable.

Experts from the University of Sydney introduced hydrogen fuel cells, a cutting-edge green technology, which promises to revolutionise energy production in the future. Students were fascinated as they learned how hydrogen fuel cells work, generating electricity through a chemical reaction between hydrogen and oxygen, with water being the only by product. Students were able to build a model car that used a hydrogen fuel cell to power the car to move and light up, inspiring students to think critically about the future of energy and their role in shaping it.

The strengthening of our Stage 3 Science opportunities in the Junior School Science Laboratory has seen students transitioning to the Senior School with stronger scientific literacy and working scientifically skills. The program run by Mr Mancinelli has greatly enhanced our students understanding of what it is to be a scientist and undertake investigations and, is a highlight for many of our Junior School students.

The Science Department are proud of the progress our students are making and look forward to further developing their passion for science and understanding of the possibilities science has to offer post school.

culture. These artworks were exhibited in the Waverley Council Library Art Gallery and formed the flags for Reconciliation Week installed on Campbell Parade, Bondi, Birrell Street and Bondi Junction Mall.

Visual Arts club

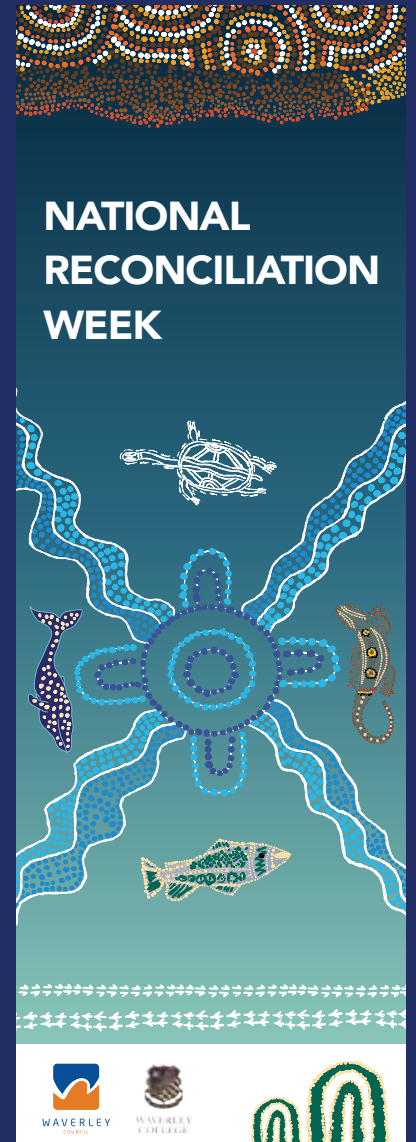
Extracurricular activity, Visual Arts Club, reflected a broad range of skills this year.

The Winter session "Digital Drawers" introduced digital illustration and animation through the use of Adobe Procreate on I pads. Students explored game setting and character design to form a basis for an individual composition for their illustrations and animations. Characters and scenes were based on a fictional world and the characters that inhabit it. Throughout the activity, unique brush styles, applying visual effects and using layers were explored to create a resolved collection of works. These were displayed in the library.

The Summer Visual Arts Club focused on Wheel throwing and controlling forms in clay. Learning to centre clay, trimming bases to add a foot and layering brush on glazes were explored throughout the course.

Mosman Youth Art Prize:

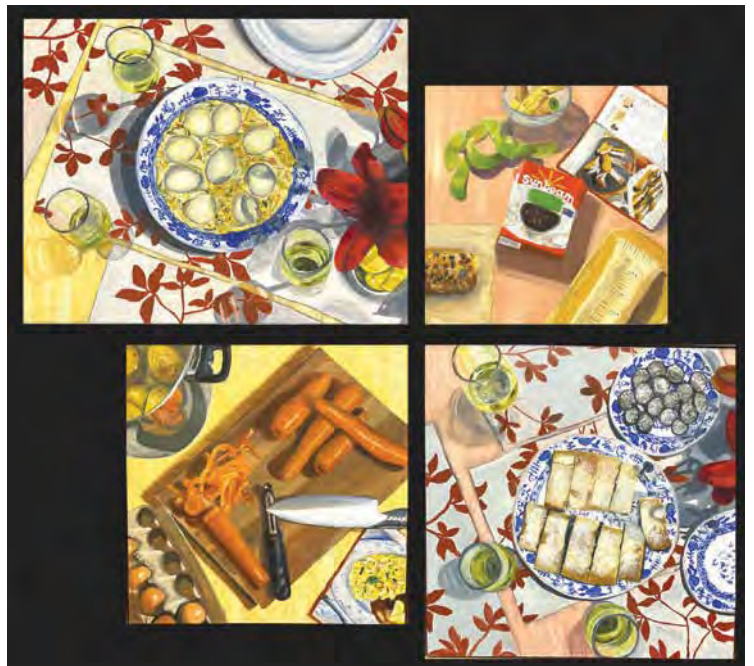

Teaching and Learning highlights

Year 11 Ceramics excursion

Year 11 Visual Design students attended a workshop at the National Art School in Darlinghurst to refine their skills in wheel throwing. Students spent the day throwing and trimming, bringing their pieces back to the college to be fired and glazed. This excursion formed the base knowledge for students to build on in their Assessment 'Function vs Form' creating home interiors.

Year 11 & 12 ARTEXPRESS Excursion

Senior Visual Arts students attended the Art Gallery of New South Wales to gain inspiration from ARTEXPRESS, an annual exhibition of exemplary artworks created by New South Wales visual arts students for the Higher

School Certificate examination. Students also navigated the new North Building, *Naala Badu*.

Year 5 Ceramic Incursion

Students from our Junior School attended an incursion in the senior school Ceramics room, to design and build a ceramic platter as a continuation of their prior learning of Indigenous artist Ms. N. Marawili Baratjala. The incursion looked at the theme of making a mark and how this can be explored in clay.

Jody Graham drawing incursion

Building skills and confidence in mixed media, students participated in a 2 day incursion with local drawing artist, Jody Graham. Exploration of materials (gouache, charcoal, inks, pen)

and the construction of their own drawing tools allowed students to loosen their natural drawing style and rework existing drawings to move to a resolved artwork. The skills learnt in these sessions were directly used to inform their own practice for their *Land, Sea and Air* unit.

Vocational Education & Training

Waverley College currently offers VET courses in Construction, Entertainment and Hospitality. VET subjects relate to an occupation and the skills involved.

The learning of these skills, hard skills (like brick and block laying, stage set up or correct knife handling) and soft skills (which enable interacting effectively and harmoniously with others such as teamwork and managing time efficiently to complete a task), allow our students to leave school both with a nationally recognised qualification and skills valued by industry, employers and further education establishments. Such skills are transferable across roles, departments, industries and countries. Studying VET subjects encourages flexibility, adaptability and problem solving. Additionally, the VET subjects count towards an ATAR should students be sitting the HSC.

Priorities have always included providing authentic industry and practical experiences for our VET students. Not only are work placement and industry experiences essential to accessing the higher bands for those sitting the HSC, such experiences allow for greater retention of knowledge, greater engagement with content, greater understanding of theoretical concepts, promotion of students' self confidence and skill acquisition.

Thank you to the competent, dedicated and invested VET team who work hard to provide the students with dynamic and forward thinking learning experiences and activities. Having worked in relevant industries, they bring their first hand knowledge and passion with them into the classroom.

Thank you to Anne O'Loughlin, Perry Stanbrook and Angelo Papayanakis, our assistants in the TAS/VET departments – all do an amazing job at ensuring the students get the best experience and resources.

A special thank you needs to be given to Ms Kathryn Knowles. With over 20 years of experience leading the VET area, her expertise has been invaluable in its growth. We are grateful for her coordination and guidance. As the number of students exploring pathways beyond the HSC increases, she will shift her focus to senior studies and careers. She leaves Mr Mark Neale to take on the VET and SBAT Coordinator role in 2025. Mr Neale has worked closely with Ms Knowles for over 10 years.

Hospitality

The Hospitality course has both theoretical and practical components. Practical work provides students with food preparation and cookery skills whilst reinforcing theoretical components of the course such as working hygienically and safely, working effectively with others and the principles behind various methods of cookery. Under the inspiration of Mr Neale and Mrs McCarthy, students are never too far from having a rewarding culinary experience.

Entertainment

Waverley College's Entertainment program allowed students to dive into the creative world of media, performance, and production. Covering areas such as lighting, sound, live performances, and digital media, this program helps students develop essential skills for the entertainment industry. With practical, hands-on learning and exposure to industry professionals, students gain the confidence and experience to pursue careers in television, film, music, theater, or event management. Led by the guidance of Mr Lamb and Mrs Cohen, the students have been integral in the functioning success of multiple musical productions this year.

The year of 2024 across VET saw the students involve themselves in activities such as:

Service Period catering events: Students catered for up to 150 staff on occasions. Dishes included pork banh mi, chicken caesar wraps, Latin American Arepa burgers and Vegan brownies.

Technical Support for College productions, events and assemblies: Students operated lighting, vision and sound for Waverley's productions of 'Lion King' and 'Tartuffe' as well as assisting in school assemblies and public Drama performances.

Getting RSA certificates: allowing the students to be job-ready and work in licensed venues as they transition beyond school.

Masterchef challenges: where students were presented with mystery boxes of unknown ingredients and had to plan, prepare, cook and present a dish fit for a five star restaurant.

Brick and Block laying:

As part of the VET Construction course at Waverley College, students complete a unit of competency in brick and block laying. This unit equips them with essential skills, terminology, and techniques for constructing brick and block structures, while also familiarising them with industry standard tools.

Portioning up whole chickens: to develop knife skills, learn about different poultry cuts and use the parts in various methods of cookery.

Pinocchio's restaurant takeover: at Souths Juniors where students enjoyed preparing, cooking and serving top quality food to family, staff and friends. Students were organised, worked collaboratively and acquired valuable industry knowledge and terminology whilst catering for 150 people.

Work placements: 70 hours out in Industry is a requirement of all VET Courses and students gained authentic industry knowledge and networks.

Sign language: British Sign Language (BSL) basics aligning with units 'Interacting with Customers' and 'Cultural Sensitivity', which cover diversity, inclusivity, anti-discrimination legislation, and various communication methods.

Hospo hub: to target the HSC: exam technique, practice questions, syllabus dot points, study notes, linking pracs to theory, importance of industry/workplace examples and how to make them relevant, unpacking the question/glossary words.

Christian Elfes won the Youth Partnership 2024 award for VET Excellence awards. Mrs Beverley McCarthy, our dedicated VET Hospitality teacher, gained the Edmund Rice Education Australia (EREA) Charter Leadership Award for 2024 in Liberating Education. This award honours her dedicated service and commitment to educating young people within our school community.

Science Laboratory

In our state-of-the-art science lab, students immerse themselves in the fascinating worlds of chemistry, biology, physics, and environmental science. Through hands-on experiments and inquiry-based learning, they build essential lab skills while fostering a deeper understanding of scientific principles. This dynamic space is designed to inspire collaboration, critical thinking, and curiosity-driven exploration.

Over the past year, students have engaged in a wide range of experiments that bring science to life. They've explored the wonders of electricity by building circuits and creating electromagnets, deepened their understanding of chemical reactions by mixing substances to observe fizzing, colour changes, and temperature shifts, and used scientific equipment to measure and analyse their findings. From testing the pH of household items using natural indicators to investigating the impact of friction and force, every activity has been a step toward mastering the scientific method.

Our science lab also serves as a hub for innovation, where students dive into robotics

and coding, applying their knowledge to solve real-world problems. Projects like designing and programming robots to complete specific tasks have allowed students to see the practical applications of STEM skills in action.

This vibrant environment has ignited a passion for science, empowering students to ask bold questions, test their ideas, and embrace the excitement of discovery. We are proud of their achievements and look forward to witnessing the innovative milestones they will reach in the coming year.

I deeply appreciate your continued support for our school and the valuable role you play in strengthening our community. I also want to express my gratitude to the Junior School staff for their commitment and hard work in helping your boys thrive and achieve their best. Their voices enriched key events throughout the year, including the heartfelt Mother's and Father's Day Masses, the inspiring Year 6 Graduation Mass, and the celebratory Presentation Day Assembly. These occasions were elevated by the exceptional piano accompaniment provided by Mr Evan Streater, Mr Thomas Azoury, and Mr Joseph Raso, whose skilful musicianship added depth and beauty to the choir's repertoire. The Cantores' commitment and their contribution to the vibrant College community have been truly commendable.

In 2024, the Waterford Concert Band and Junior School Beginner Band demonstrated outstanding growth in ensemble skills while exploring an exciting repertoire. Under the experienced direction of Mr Dan Williams, with support from Mr Tim Walsh, both bands thrived under their passionate leadership and strong connection with the students. The Junior School enjoyed several performances throughout the year, highlighted by a memorable showcase at the Junior School Music Festival and a remarkable combined performance at this year's Presentation Day Assembly.

The Production Club was introduced to the Junior School in 2024, offering Years 5 and 6 boys the opportunity to meet weekly and refine their skills. They explored programs like GarageBand and Soundtrap while also delving into the practical side of recording and production, including equipment and setup. Throughout the year, the students produced impressive songs and remixes, all while having a fantastic time!

The Guitar Ensemble, guided by Mr Jesse Johnston, held weekly sessions to hone their skills. Their efforts concluded in a standout performance at the Junior School Music Festival, showcasing a unique rendition of Coldplay's 'Clocks.'

The Junior School Rock Band program included both Year 5 and Year 6 groups. Under the dedicated leadership of Mr Jesse Johnston, the boys demonstrated significant growth in their instrumental skills and self-confidence throughout the year. At the Junior School Music Festival, the Year 5 Rock Band delivered a lively rendition of the Steve Miller Band's 'The Joker,' while the Year 6 Rock Band thrilled the audience with an electrifying AC/DC medley of 'Highway to Hell' and 'TNT', inspiring enthusiastic singalongs and applause!

In 2024, the Junior School proudly staged its first-ever production in the form of Disney's 'The Lion King Junior.' This monumental project involved over 300 students from Years 5 and 6 and included 11 girls from St Catherine's Junior School in the main cast. After almost two terms of rehearsals, the stage was set (or quite literally built!) for two performances: a matinee show (which was also attended by Year 6 classes from St Catherine's) and a sold-out evening performance. The production was not only a creative triumph but also an incredibly educationally engaging experience, offering students valuable skills in teamwork, design and performance, making it deeply rewarding for all involved.

Thank you to all the directors, tutors and accompanists who have worked with our Junior School boys in 2024, we appreciate your guidance and support. Thank you also to all the boys in the Junior School who have engaged so positively with the arts this year – your participation and your support of your peers is so important and greatly appreciated!

Mission & Identity

2024 has been a year of wonderful growth for all our Identity and Mission activities. It has been a year where we have continued to build on our Social Justice and Student Identity initiatives. It has been fabulous to see so many of our young men willing to take up the challenge to step out of their comfort zones and they are to be commended on the ways they have put their faith into action.

Our Campus Ministry team expanded to include Mr Tom Kennedy as the Spirituality and Mission Coordinator and Ms Cath Lipman as our Social Justice Coordinator. Both have provided invaluable support and helped in the organisation of some wonderful formation activities for our students. Our Immersion program has expanded to include Fiji, Timor-Leste, Cambodia and Bowraville. Relationships with the communities we serve were further developed and as a result we will be adding an extra village to our Fiji program, and in 2026 will be hoping to add Kenya to our program. We also followed up our programs with some donations of much needed resources.

Throughout the year, our Prefects and SRC also led by example, and took opportunities such as their Prefect afternoon teas, to host a variety of schools, and share ideas and

initiatives. Activities to celebrate St Patrick's Day, Pancake Tuesday, House Dodgeball, Touch Football, Chess, Wavefest and Basketball competitions were all undertaken with great enthusiasm and enjoyed great support from all Year groups. These leaders also introduced a Wellbeing forum for students and parents/carers which proved to be very popular and will become an annual initiative. These leaders also orchestrated the *Waves Weekly* bulletin to keep the College up to date with our weekly events.

Our Social Justice program has continued to expand from Year 5 through to Year 12. This year we were privileged to introduce the opportunity for our Year 12s to take part in the St Vincent de Paul Night Patrol. This enabled our students to prepare food and deliver it to the homeless and disadvantaged in the Bayside area of Sydney. Our Years 5 and 6

students generously donated noodles, fruit and muesli bars to assist with these meals. Our Year 8s volunteered at Our Big Kitchen and helped prepare meals for the homeless, whilst our Years 7 and 9 groups in their Religion classes were able to experience an encounter with the Salvation Army and the wonderful works in which they are involved.

Throughout the year our Year 11 students continued to be involved in a wide variety of social justice activities ranging from bowling with the disabled to volunteering at elderly nursing homes. Our Year 10s throughout Service Week volunteered at a variety of places including working with students living with disabilities, to helping the elderly and disadvantaged within our community. No matter where they helped it was great to hear and see our students putting their faith into action, and they received glowing reports



outlining their outstanding contributions made throughout these experiences.

Servant Leadership is the key to being an effective leader, and our students will continue to be given many opportunities through our service programs over the coming years to further develop these skills. It is our hope that by putting others before themselves, they will not only be able to help others, but also realise their own potential.

Our Kairos Retreat program continued to flourish this year, and I would especially like to thank all our senior students and Old Boys of the College who continued this student-led retreat initiative.

A special thank you to the senior students who made up our liturgical group this

year. Their initiative in helping prepare and organise our liturgical celebrations helped to foster greater spiritual development and formation opportunities for all involved.

Our Walawaani Indigenous group continued to flourish this year under the guidance of our Aboriginal Liaison Officer, Mr Kevin Heath. Painting, dancing, and music activities are enabling our Indigenous students to develop in confidence and improve the cultural awareness of our community, as we continue to develop an effective and inclusive program.

This year also saw the continuation of our Pasifika Brothers and Haka Warrior program. Our Pasifika students placed a creditable 4th in the NSW PCYC Haka Warrior competition and were commended on their outstanding

effort and dedication. The judges repeatedly highlighted the boys' exceptional crowd engagement and the humour they infused into their performance, which played a significant role in achieving such a high score. A special thank you to the Sione family for their support and encouragement of the students.

I am sure that 2025 will be an even better year, with many more initiatives offered that will enable our students to continue to put their faith into action, as they strive to live out our 2025 theme "Driven by Passion; Inspired to Serve."

Social Justice

Waverley College is an EREA School in the tradition of Edmund Rice, encompassing the Catholic Schools charter for education in all areas of student formation. It is a school that is privileged to have inherited a rich tradition and a spirituality that among other things stresses that God can be readily found in all circumstances of our lives and that each person is unique and special in God's eyes.

The EREA Touchstones underline all that we do and include: Liberating Education, Gospel Spirituality, Inclusive Community & Justice and Solidarity. These Touchstones embrace an education that stresses that "Love is shown in deeds". It aims to prepare the students to go into the world to be *men and women with and for others*.

We are all challenged to go out of our way to give to others, to work for the good of the human community, especially with those who may be marginalised in some way by society. In order to promote this awareness of others, an EREA education looks for opportunities to invite students to see service of others as more fulfilling than success or prosperity.

Our theme at Waverley College for 2024 is **Stronger together, United as one.**

This draws on our College touchstones, which we aspire to follow as a part of the Catholic ethos in the Edmund Rice tradition.

As we live out these touchstones in the Waverley Community we are drawn together to work in unity using the strength that comes from collaboration, solidarity and a sense of togetherness. We are called through the mission of the school to:

- Unite towards common goals of liberating education through our role as teachers
- building an inclusive community through our treatment of others
- and living out our gospel values by helping others.

In our social justice program we aim to inspire teamwork and cooperation by both students

and staff to instil those values that make us global citizens in order to make a difference in our world today. Our program is designed to introduce students from year 5 to year 12 to communities in need outside of the school environment and teach them how to live with integrity and faith to help others.

This year was an exciting and innovative year for social justice at Waverley College, with students introduced to opportunities to serve others in year 5 through to year 12. Our focus moved to an inclusive approach of broadening the scoop with which students could learn and live out the gospel values in an all encompassing program. Linking the Religious Education curriculum directly to the immersive experience of working with local communities allowed students to engage and interact with a range of people in need and various charitable organisations.

The impact on the wider community and organisations was unquestionable, with year 9 and year 7 students partaking in the Salvation Army workshops which addressed the issue of homelessness and rough sleeping in Australia. All students in these cohorts were given the opportunity to listen and inquire about the challenges met in Australia by those affected by homelessness. Our presenters answered questions and engaged students, bringing a different perspective on people sleeping rough and giving possibilities of how to help others through charitable works and compassion. As part of this program, Waverley College took part in the Salvation Army Christmas appeal whereby families and students donated food items and goods which were packed by staff at the end of term 4 and donated to the Salvation Army

before Christmas which would be delivered to over 140 local families in need.

The impact on the local communities and the students of Waverley College was also evident by the partnership with Our Big Kitchen in Bondi. The year 8 cohort participated in a program run by OBK whereby students assisted in cooking and packing food which would be delivered to hospitals, children and families in need and those sleeping rough. Students were introduced to interfaith dialogue, a combined effort between the Jewish community and Waverley College to assist others through charity and service.

These initiatives were also supported throughout the year through the work done by our senior students. Year 11 and 12 participated in the Vinnies Van Night Patrol program whereby students volunteered to make food and feed the homeless in Sydney supervised by staff at Waverley College. This opportunity saw students interact with clients of all walks of life, providing not only food but conversation and kindness to others in the community.

The year 11 cohort experienced a wide range of community interactions through volunteering at local organisations such as aged care homes, OBK, local schools for students with disabilities, swim programs for kids with autism, Jarjum College, bowling with disabled clients, cooking for those in need and serving others. These opportunities were invaluable in the formation of each student, providing a sense of service and citizenship and gaining an understanding of what it means to be a valuable member of society.

An integral part of our social justice program is year 10 service week which calls on every student to volunteer in an area of service that they can be of assistance. Students were able to draw on their skills to assist the marginalised in the community. The feedback from organisations was tremendous and the transformation in students evident from the start to the end of the week. One of the highlights of Year 10 service week was the immersion to Bowraville, a rural community in the North Coast of NSW who were thrilled with the work done by our students at the local school. Students from Waverley College learnt from First Nations People and worked alongside the community to gain an understanding and appreciation for all those involved.

Another highlight of the year was Our Faith in Action Week which as a school, gave all students and teachers the opportunity to demonstrate their faith and live out their values within the school. Visitors from Wheel Chair sports came to play basketball with students and teach the importance of resilience and opportunity, our guest speaker Ismail Ibrahim addressed the College in areas of justice and inclusivity whilst our Pasifika

brothers and Walawaani students performed traditional dance and smoke ceremony, giving students an opportunity to learn and grow through culture.

This year our Helping Hearts and Hands program for staff was in term 4 which coincided with the Salvation Army Appeal and the demand for charity and assistance during the holiday period. The contribution of the staff to communities saw the wayside chapel receive over 300 baked goods to be handed out to those in need. The Matthew Talbot Hostel and Red Cross were also organisations in need and their gratitude evident in the statistics - saving 18 lives through blood donation.

The partnerships formed between the College, including students, teachers, staff and families and the organisations which we serve are invaluable and demonstrate the commitment of Waverley College to the EREA charter. As we strive to live out the touchstones, these social justice initiatives all contribute to the faith and formation of our students, who through serving others we learn gratitude and develop a sense of compassion and understanding of others. The gifts of each

person provides the capacity to build positive relationships with others and fosters a growth mindset with an expansive capacity to live out the gospel values of faith and hope.

A special thanks goes out to all of the community organisations who accepted and mentored Waverley College students throughout 2024. These include but are not limited to; Our Big Kitchen, Illowra Nursing Home, Wheelchair Sports NSW, Wairoa School, Jarjum College, Reverend Bill Crews Foundation, St Edmunds College, Windgap Foundation, Dippers, The Salvation Army, St Vincent de Paul Society, Matthew Talbot Hostel and the many schools who support our program.

I would also like to express my sincere gratitude to all of those involved in the social justice program at the College. Your support with new initiatives and the generous donations given by families have been an integral part of expanding this program and I look forward to another year of service to others.

SOTWEG Leads the Way

Building on Our Commitment to Sustainability and Ethics

Last year, we celebrated the incredible impact of students engaging in ecological initiatives, highlighting how their efforts contributed to a more sustainable and ethical world while fostering leadership, responsibility, and empathy. This year, the Students of the World Ecology Group (SOTWEG) has carried this momentum forward, transforming ambition into action and vision into reality.

This year, SOTWEG continued to embrace the ethos of Pope Francis's *Laudato Si'*, further embedding the principles of sustainability and ethical practices into the fabric of Waverley College. As the climate crisis and social inequalities grow ever more pressing, these students have risen to the challenge, reaffirming their role as global citizens committed to meaningful change.



A Beacon of Hope for the Future

SOTWEG's journey this year underscores the power of youth to drive meaningful change. By living out the principles of *Laudato Si'* and advancing the *United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals*, these students are not only shaping Waverley College into a model of sustainability but are also contributing to a global movement for a more equitable and mindful world.

As we reflect on this year's accomplishments and look ahead to 2025, it is clear that the next generation of leaders is rising to the challenge, carrying with them a message of hope, responsibility, and action.

Strengthening College Ecological Initiatives

This year saw an expansion of Waverley College's sustainable practices, spearheaded by SOTWEG. Guided by the principles of Laudato Si' and United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals, these initiatives included:

Solar Energy Expansion: The installation of additional solar panels on campus to reduce the College's carbon footprint.

Biodiversity Project: Creating pollinator-friendly gardens and planting native trees, enhancing the campus environment and supporting local wildlife.

Charitable Drives: Collecting and redistributing pre-loved school supplies and clothing to support families in need, combining sustainability with social justice.

Collaborative Action: In an exciting step forward, the College hosted its inaugural Ecology Symposium in October. This event brought together students, educators, and environmental leaders to drive change through tangible action. The symposium was a testament to SOTWEG's leadership and their vision to inspire even greater action within the wider community.

Global Connections: SOTWEG's reach extended beyond local communities, building bridges with like-minded young leaders globally. Collaborations with colleges in India and South Africa, students fostered cross-cultural exchanges of ideas and solutions. These partnerships exemplify the Laudato Si' message that environmental and social challenges transcend borders, requiring united efforts.

Global Citizenship: SOTWEG members came together for one final meaningful activity at the end of the year that combined teamwork, compassion, and global awareness. Students assembled 400 birthing kits destined for pregnant women in underserved areas who lack access to hospitals and essential medical care.

This event was part of the College's ongoing commitment to service and global citizenship. By engaging in activities like this, students learned the value of giving back and the power of collective action.

In 2024 the Wellbeing structures and programs at Waverley College entered a positive new phase, as new structures and initiatives were rolled out across the College. These changes were the result of over 12 months of hard work by the Heads of House and Wellbeing Team to ensure that all students are supported by age-appropriate, context-driven and research-backed programs that meet the needs of the Waverley student and their families.

The new developments in Wellbeing at Waverley covered a range of different areas. These included; our new Kanyini Program in Years 7-9, our revamped Wellbeing Time now dubbed 'Connection, Culture, Communication (CCC) Time,' a refresh of our overall Wellbeing Framework in conjunction with the Association of Independent Schools (AIS), and a new position within the College being the Head of Student Wellbeing. All of these facets are underpinned by the vision of the Wellbeing team, which is to ensure that Waverley College is a safe and supportive community, where all individuals are known, valued and challenged, allowing them to reach their full potential.

What is the Kanyini program?

'Kanyini' is a Pitjantjatjara word meaning inter-connectedness; to care for, to support, to nurture and protect. Kanyini is best expressed in English as the combination of the two words 'responsibility' and 'love', but it is actually a relationship; it is an enormous

caring with no limit. The teaching of Kanyini comes from Mr Robert James Randall (c1934 - 2015) also known as Uncle Bob, who was an Aboriginal Elder, singer and community leader and a member of the Stolen Generations.

The purpose of our Wellbeing program revolves around the profound concept of **Kanyini**, which encapsulates the *interconnectedness* of individuals and the values of *caring for, supporting, nurturing, and protecting one another*. Kanyini, a word deeply rooted in Indigenous Australian culture, surpasses the translation of "responsibility" and "love" in English; it represents a relationship characterised by *boundless care*. Through the Waverley College Kanyini program, we aim to foster a strong sense of connection - ensuring that each young man is known and valued, celebrating diversity, and facilitating open and empathic communication, ultimately promoting holistic wellbeing and a sense of unity within our community.

What will students have learnt in the Kanyini program?

In 2024, students embarked on a holistic journey to enhance their wellbeing and personal growth. They were taught essential life skills and values, starting with the cultivation of a growth mindset, and empowered with resilience and self-worth. Students learnt to build healthy relationships, address bullying, and embrace inclusivity, diversity, and collaboration. This program also focused on mental health, emotional intelligence, and self-care, emphasising the importance of positive emotion and promoting strategies for stress management. Students discovered the significance of quality sleep, and mindful breathing, along with nutrition and hydration, ultimately fostering a strong sense of personal power, connection, and self-awareness.

We look forward to the continuation of this program in 2025.

CCC Time?

'CCC Time', short for Connection, Culture and Communication, is 15 minutes dedicated to student wellbeing each day. During this time, we emphasise the fostering of culture and connections within the College, House, and the smaller CCC Time groups. We authentically nurture a culture of inclusion, embracing the College touchstone of inclusive community, and facilitate communication to deepen connections and strengthen both Waverley and the House culture. It is through these daily initiatives that students cultivate a sense of belonging and connection with their mentors and peers across Years 7-12.

During CCC Time, students engage in the following activities each week:

Monday: 'Circle Time' provides students with a platform to come together, promoting inclusivity, agency, positivity, equity, and respect. They discuss upcoming events, current affairs, weekend outcomes, and more.

Tuesday: Students focus on 'forward planning', enhancing organisational skills, managing assessment schedules, and revisiting their SMART goals, both long and short term.

Wednesday: Dubbed 'Waves Wednesday,' features senior-led activities, fostering student voice and leadership within their smaller Wellbeing groups. Each Wednesday, students from Years 12, 11, and 10 take turns leading a range of activities. This initiative provides our senior students with leadership

opportunities along with allowing students in Years 7-9 to view their senior counterparts through a different lens. Waves Wednesday lends itself to ensuring that leadership is the responsibility of all.

Thursday: Groups have the flexibility to engage in 'something different,' exploring House and Wellbeing group activities tailored to their interests.

Friday: Fridays alternate between 'House assemblies' and 'circle time.' House assemblies foster a sense of community, discussing College events, key announcements, and team-building activities. Circle time on Fridays allows for reflection on the week and discussion of upcoming weekend events in the co-curricular space.

The overarching goal of CCC Time is to instil in students a profound connection to their House, school, and peers, ensuring that each student feels known, valued, and challenged to reach their potential. Providing opportunities for a break from screens and promoting conversation and engagement are central to fostering student wellbeing during this time.

Key wellbeing issues are often introduced and spoken about at an assembly, additional context provided at House meetings, then unpacked further by Mentors in smaller wellbeing groups, using units of work and activities on CANVAS.


We have five registered psychologists on campus who have commenced proactive programs to support our students. In the

Junior School they currently run mental health classes alongside the classroom teachers and both the Junior and Senior campus run board game clubs and social skills programs. We also have a College Registered Nurse who manages our Health Centre. All staff (both teaching and non-teaching) are trained in Mental Health First Aid.






A normal schedule of wellbeing incursions, activities and guest speakers occurred again in 2024 including our Big Brother Little Brother Program, R U OK? Day, Year 10 Service Week, Years 7 and 8 camps, Year 12 Retreat, International Women's Day, the National Day of Action Against Bullying and Violence, Wear it Purple Day and the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women. It was wonderful to see over 200 students march in the Step Up, Speak Out walk to raise awareness about domestic violence, asking everyone to stand up and say no to domestic violence. We also thoroughly enjoyed listening to guest speakers throughout the year including Mr Gus Worland, Ms Jelena Dokic, Mr Stan Grant, Mr Daniel Witthaus and Mr Jay Stevens.

Incursions included ySafe presentations for all students and families in cybersafety, drug and alcohol expert Mr Paul Dillon presenting to parents/carers and Years 10 and 11. Year 10 enjoyed the popular motor vehicle maintenance course, Galmatic, learning essential skills and embracing a new level of automotive empowerment.

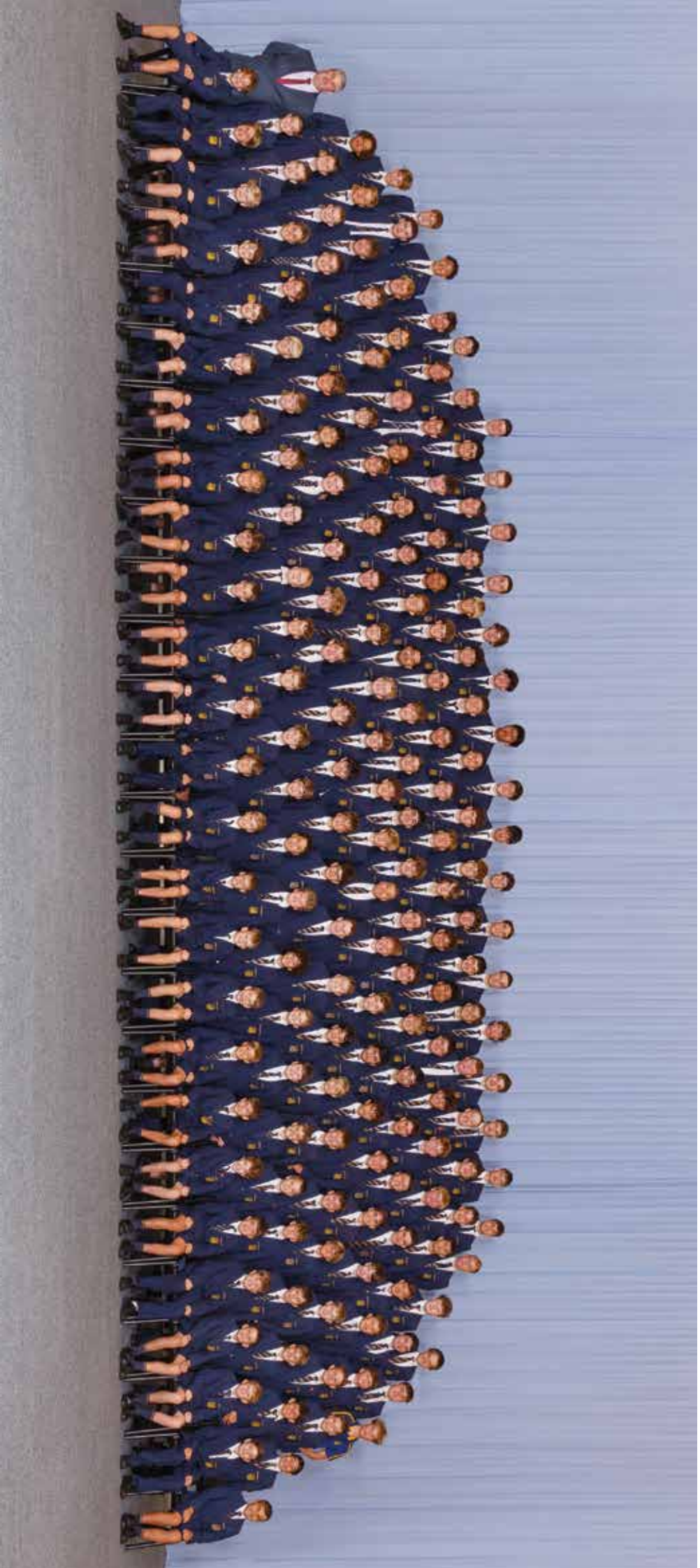

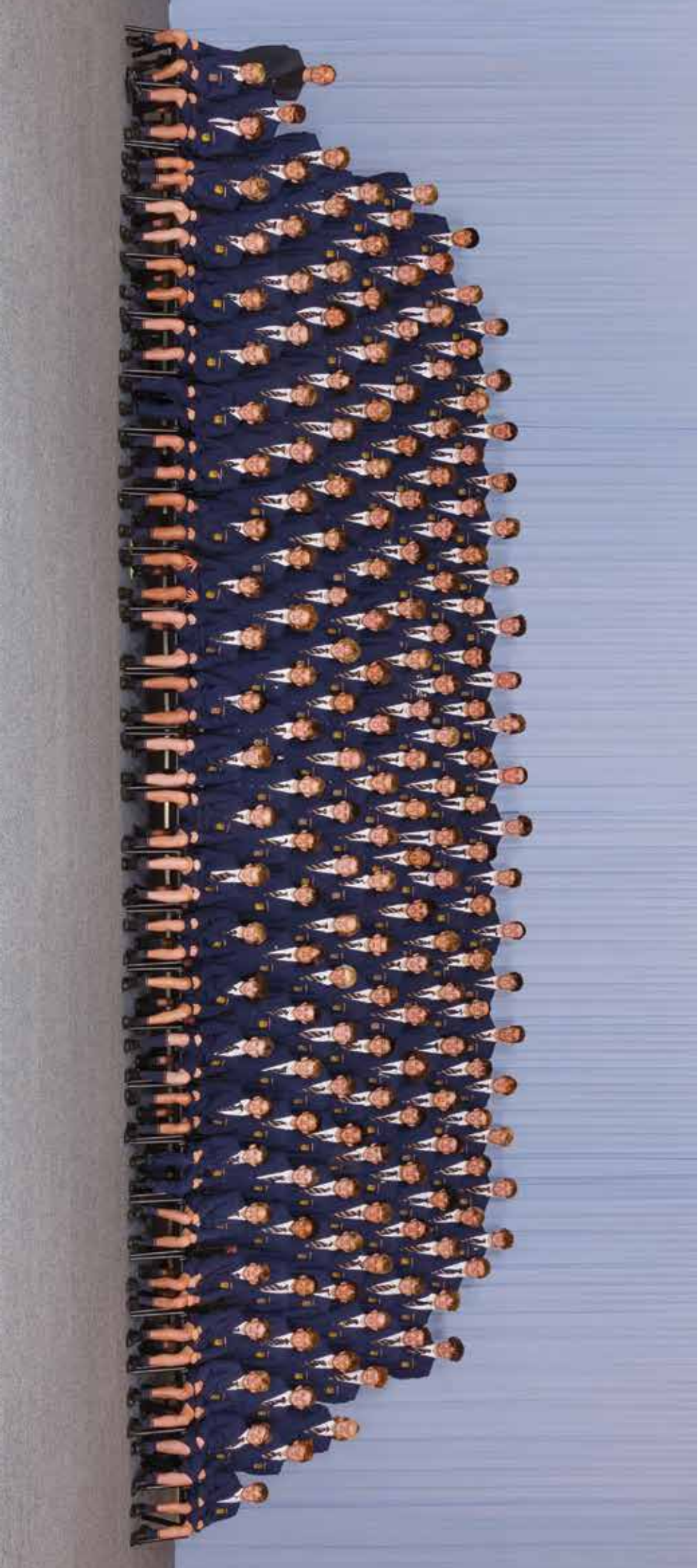

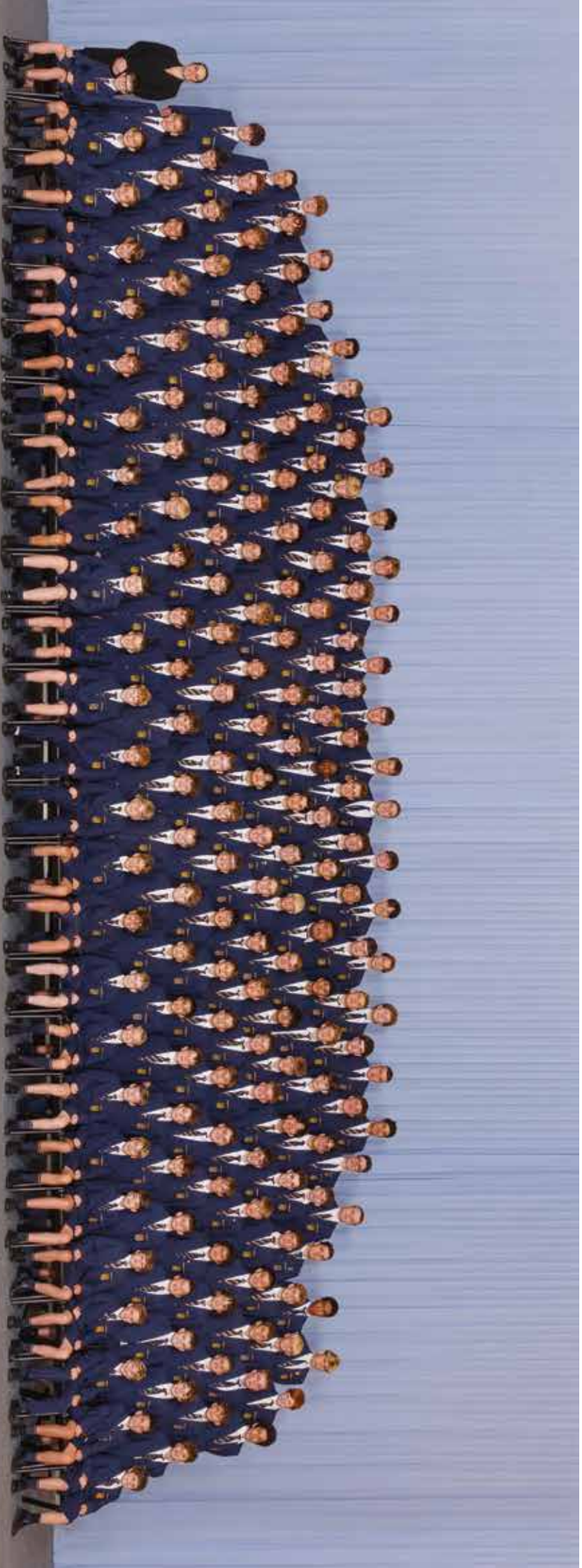

Tevlin's Wellbeing Highlights

Term 1 was full of action outside the classroom, with Years 5, 7 and 9 all enjoying camps and the ability to challenge themselves outdoors and strengthen friendships. Years 6 and 8 did likewise in Term 4, while Year 11 also had a fantastic 3-day retreat. Year 10 had a hugely successful Service week engaged in community service with charitable, education or health related services.

Tevlin's House Mass in Term 2 was a further highlight, with all boys and many parents enjoying a student-led Mass and bless our Year 12 students. In the month prior, Tevlin House led a school-wide donation drive for the Matthew Talbot Hostel Winter Appeal, and at the sleepout, over 300 toiletry and kitchen packs were created by the boys in teams to support those experiencing homelessness in our city, with boys displaying their continued commitment towards compassion. 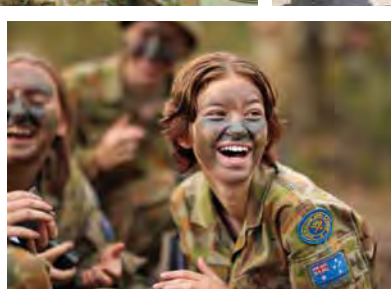

The 2023-2024 CAS Cricket season was marked by remarkable success for Waverley Cricket. Two As teams secured premierships, a significant number of players were selected for CAS representative sides, and all teams remained competitive throughout the season.

These accomplishments are a testament not only to exceptional individual performances but also to the enhanced skill sets of all cricketers at Waverley College who play an attacking brand of cricket. The continuation batting club, centre wicket practice, and specialised fielding sessions were instrumental in these successes. towards greater consistency. The 9B and 2nd XI epitomised the essence of Waverley Cricket—passion for the game, a commitment to excellence, and camaraderie.

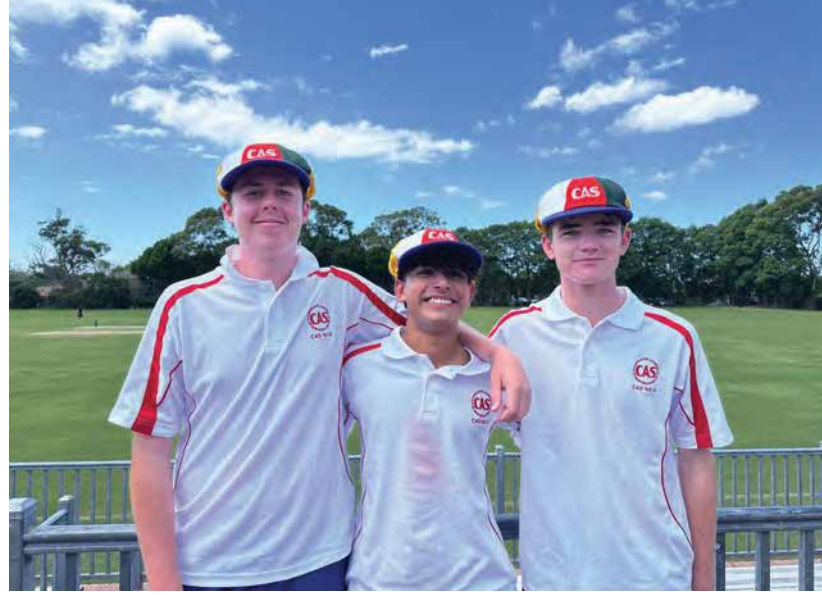

Cross Country Senior School

What will be most remembered by the 2024 Waverley College Cross Country season was that the team showed up to training and the races each and every week and represented the best of what the college has to offer. The season culminated in the CAS Cross Country Championships on August 10th at Upjohn Park, Rydalmere, where the team gave their all on the familiar yet demanding course, making for a thrilling final race.

Beginning at Upjohn Park on May 4th, in wet conditions the Waverley & St Aloysius Invitational kicked off the season. Evan Rowbotham set the tone for a dominant year placing first, while Koji Howard in his debut season placed 11th, ably supported by Jarrah (28th), and Xavier Wright (44th) all showing great promise for the season. Jack Richardson (15th) led the Intermediate team supported by Joshua Peters (17th), and Asher Thomasyu (14th) spearheaded the Open Boys.

Next came the CIS Trial Round (May 28th) at The King's School. Evan again dominated finishing 1st, while Koji came 13th, Jarrah (30th), and Jaden Truscott (44th) all qualifying for the CIS Championships. In the Open division, Asher led the way coming 16th, earning his spot on the CAS team.

On the 15th of June St Ignatius Invitational took place at Riverview, with another wet and treacherous course. Despite the slippery course, deep puddles, and sharp hills Evan triumphed again, taking 1st place with Koji (7th), Jarrah (19th), and Daniel Duffin (23rd) all delivering excellent results; while Alex Marshall came (11th) impressing in his Intermediate division debut. through the 8 km course to lead the Open team coming in 18th.

The season also presented its share of challenging courses, particularly the Barker Invitational, June 22nd at St Ives Showground, where muddy terrain and water obstacles tested the runners. In the Intermediate race, Alex (7th) and Blake (43rd) ran determined races, while Asher (11th) led the Open squad through the tough conditions.

Finally to the penultimate event the Trinity Relays (July 27th), where athletes competed in relay teams alongside alumni and staff. The Junior team (Evan, Jarrah, Koji, and Daniel) secured 2nd place out of 30 teams, while the Intermediate team (Alex, Joshua, Jack, and Blake) also claimed 2nd place, earning well-deserved medals. The staff team ably led by Mr Roff also ran well – however, the Spratt record again alluded us, much to Roffs frustration.

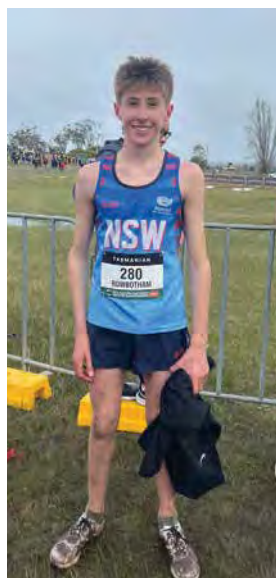
So to Upjohn Park and the final race of the season. Evan delivered yet another dominant performance, securing 1st place and earning

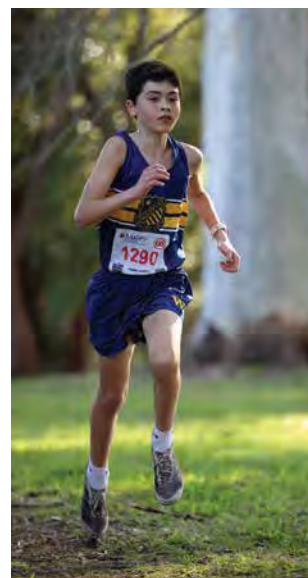

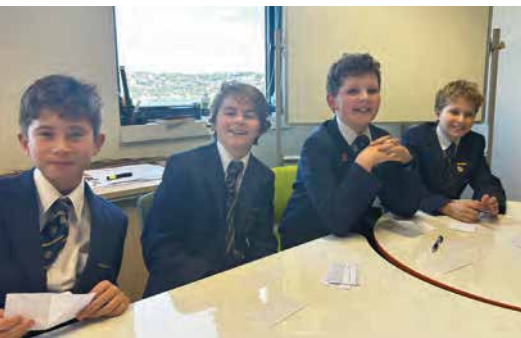

STEM

This winter, students took on an exciting STEM challenge: designing and creating their own Automata Mechanical Toys. For centuries, automata – intricate mechanical devices that move in amusing or fascinating ways – have delighted people of all ages. These remarkable machines rely on fundamental mechanical principles that are still used in modern engineering, such as cams, gears, levers, pulleys, ratchets, and cranks.

Through this project, students learned about the various mechanical mechanisms that make automata work and explored how each mechanism produces different types of movement. They researched existing designs to gain inspiration and insight into their own creations. After sketching their ideas and selecting the mechanisms that best suited their designs, it was time to move into the workshop.

In the workshop, students took a sustainable approach by using offcuts of pine to build the frame of their toys, while plywood was laser cut and etched to create the characters. The use of Adobe Illustrator for the laser cutting process was a key skill development, and it was great to see students becoming proficient in the software. This skill is

especially beneficial for students studying Mandatory Technology in Years 7 and 8.

The students produced a wide variety of innovative and creative designs, including:

Max Wu's Koala: A delightful creation where a koala moves up and down behind a eucalyptus tree.

Tom Brown's Plane: A plane soaring through the air with impressive mechanical movement.

Noah Nunn's Rocket Ship: A rocket ship blasting off into space, full of energy and imagination.

Cooper Hawkin's Minion: A charming minion bobbing up and down in a playful motion.

Jonathan Tyler's 'Larry' Twitter Bird: A fun design featuring the iconic bird, full of character and movement.

Will Thompson's Caterpillar: A quirky caterpillar that moves in a fun, repetitive motion.

I am incredibly proud of the effort, creativity, and perseverance each student demonstrated throughout this project. Not only did they produce entertaining and unique designs, but they also developed valuable skills in areas that were new to many of them. The challenge was a great success, and the results were a testament to the hard work and dedication of the students.

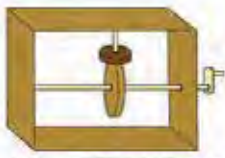
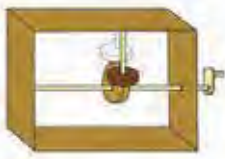
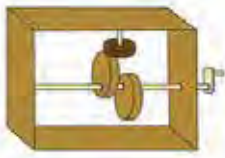
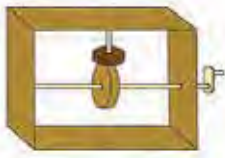
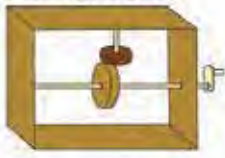


A Snail Cam causes the follower to rise and drop suddenly. It can only turn in one direction otherwise the mechanism will jam.

The summer season is a wonderful opportunity for athletes to continue developing their passion for the sport in a variety of competition scenarios, be it through the junior pathway of Little Athletics NSW (LANSW) or competing in senior club competitions across the state with Athletics NSW.

Weekly meets at ES Marks Athletics Field provided a relaxed atmosphere where athletes could hone their skills across a variety of disciplines, before progressing to compete at a Zone, Regional or even State level through the LANSW program. Even more impressive were the number of students who competed at the NSW Junior Championships, an event attracting over 1,500 high school students from all across the state for three days of intense competition at Sydney Olympic Park. George Lambousis (Year 7), Vaidas Levi (Year 8, Gold Javelin), Evan Rowbotham (Year 9, Gold 800m, Gold 1,500m, Gold 3,000m), Lachlan Feain (Year 9, Gold 1,500m), Wol Albino (Year 10, Bronze 200 metres), Jack Richardson (Year 10), Zoran Szekeres (Year 11, Bronze Shot Put), Alex Marshall (Year 11, Silver 800m), Ricardo Zanapalis (Year 12, Bronze Long Jump), Asher Thomasyu (Year 12, Bronze 800m).

The peak of the summer season was actually in the holiday period at the conclusion of Term 1, where athletes listed above travelled to Adelaide to take on the country's best at the National Championships – further showing their dedication to the athletic program with countless hours poured in over several months, going well above and beyond co-curricular expectations. Viadas Levi was tremendous in winning a Bronze in the U15s Javelin with a huge throw of 42.08m, just one centimetre short of the silver. The most outstanding results however came from Evan Rowbotham who completed the 800 / 1,500 / 3,000m treble, taking victory across all three events, which had many athletes

competing who would specialise in only one. This tremendous effort would easily be one of the greatest achievements by a Waverley Track & Field athlete ever, with the school buzzing to see him dominate at the 2024 CAS Track & Field Championships!

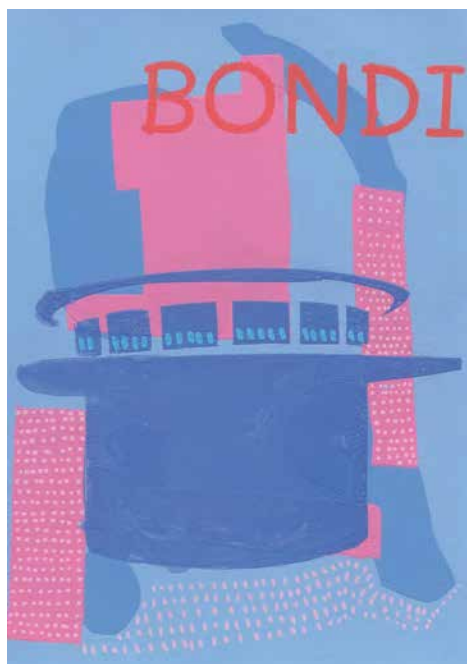
Track & Field Junior School

Students explored a range of silkscreen media to produce a series of large scale works. Imagery was sourced from student drawings, photographs and existing collected images. Students learnt to design and prepare stencils along with creating digital stencils to be printed using the Riso Mi-Screen. Students experimented with Photographic digital software to navigate compositions and digital screen exposures were learnt in this process.

Jake Saad, Harvey Smith, Jonathan Tyler and Aiden Avenell's completed silkscreen collages were selected as Finalists in the Mosman Youth Art Prize, 2024. The prize, created by Australian artist Ken Done AM in 1988, celebrates and fosters 'Artists of the Future'. Congratulations to these four students.

In addition to working on a sustained print, students were working collaboratively to produce 3 silkscreen artworks to donate to the Incognito Art Show, 2024. All artworks are sold anonymously for \$100, with profits going to programs at *Studio A* and *We Are Studios*, organisations that support professional development for artists living with disability. Each student work has been sold.

Yoga

Summer

2024 marked the fourth season of the official Yoga program at Waverley College, ably led by experienced instructor Ms Bianca Machliss (BSc, BAppSc (Physiotherapy)). The Yoga program has been popular, attracting a wide range of students from all years, with different strengths, skill sets and abilities.

The style of yoga that Ms Machliss has developed over the last 30 years is called the SynergyMethod. The Synergy Method is a fusion of several well-known styles of yoga (Hatha, Iyengar, Ashtanga) in conjunction with the knowledge gained from study of Physiotherapy. There are six sequences in the Synergy Method.

At Waverley College one sequence was taught progressively over each Term, resulting in the students being able to practice a flowing, dynamic, meditative routine to music, with very little instruction, by the final weeks. Each sequence followed a similar structure with a series of warm up exercises, followed by standing poses, then floor poses and finishing with a shoulder stand, meditation, breathing exercises and relaxation.

Each of the Synergy sequences had a different set of postures linked together to vary the practice and keep it interesting. Each posture had a simple and a complex version which enabled each student to do the posture that was best suited to their ability. Through repetition the postures became easier, coordination and spatial awareness improved, enabling the practice to become flowing and linked to the breathing, and as a result the mind became calm. As a by-product of the practice, strength, balance, range of movement and flexibility all improved.

There were three yoga sessions per week, so classes were varied, while still keeping the focus on the primary Synergy sequence we were learning. The first session during the week consisted of warm up, followed by a focus on Inversions, learning handstands and forearm balance. The second session of the week was a more restorative class with emphasis on stretching, calming, relaxing, breathing and meditation techniques and the third session was a flow through practice of the Synergy sequence that we were working on in the overall theme through the Term.

The aim of the Yoga program is to introduce the students to techniques to acquire focus,

calm, a healthy body and a healthy mind. Yoga is a practice that can be continued for life and is a great addition to the student "toolbox" of life skills learnt at Waverley College.

The College Motto & Crest

'Virtus Sola Nobilitat', the words inscribed beneath the crest, have been translated in a number of ways over the years. The most literal translation is 'Virtue alone ennobles', but in more recent times the College has adopted 'Virtue is its own reward'.

The motto suggests that a person should not be motivated by a potential reward, but rather by the knowledge that whatever they do should be fundamentally good.

The most obvious feature of the College crest is the gold star. This star has long been associated with the traditional crest of the Christian Brothers, the founders of the College. As the star shines in the darkness it is symbolic of enlightenment, guidance and instruction, key elements in the mission of Waverley College, following in the tradition of Blessed Edmund Rice.

The star also alludes to Mary as Stella Maris, the star of the sea. Given our long-standing devotion to Our Lady, together with the Sodality of Our Lady and the Annual May Procession, this is highly appropriate. Just as generations of seafarers used the stars for guidance, Mary's life as the Mother of God is seen as a guide for our own lives.

The Brothers taught their classes that four of the five gold bars stood for the four Cardinal Virtues of Prudence, Justice, Temperance and Fortitude, while the fifth bar related to the three Theological Virtues of Faith, Hope and Charity.

The College colours of blue and gold are borrowed from the heraldic descriptions where blue (azure) is associated with Truth and Loyalty, while gold (or) is symbolic of Generosity.



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
